Scripture: Romans 12:3-18

In light of the grace I have from God, I urge each of you not to exaggerate your own importance. Each of you must judge yourself soberly by the standard of faith God has given you. Just as each of us has one body with many members - and these members don't have the same function - so all of us, in union with Christ, form one body. And as members of that one body, we belong to each other. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift is prophecy, use it in proportion to your faith. If your gift is ministry, use it for service. If you are a teacher, use your gift for teaching. If you are good at preaching, then preach boldly. If you give to charity, do so generously; if you are a leader, exercise your authority with care; if you help others, do so cheerfully.

Your love must be sincere. Hate what is evil and cling to what is good. Love one another with the affection of siblings. Try to outdo one another in showing respect. Don't grow slack, but be fervent in spirit: the one you serve is Christ. Rejoice in hope; be patient under trial; persevere in prayer. Look on the needs of God's holy people as your own; be generous in offering hospitality. Bless your persecutors - bless and don't curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Have the same attitude toward everyone. Don't be condescending to those who aren't as well off as you; don't be conceited. Don't repay evil with evil. Be concerned with the highest ideal in the eyes of all people. Do all you can to be at peace with everyone.

Blessing Work: A Litany for Labor Day

One: O Lord, we give thanks this day for work:

for work that sustains, for the work that fulfills,

who work at jobs that demean or destroy,

channels of your blessing in the midst of our daily labors.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

One: To this end we renew our vows, begun in baptism,
to extend your redemptive purpose in
the many and varied places of our work.

In factory or field, in sheltered office or under open sky,
using technical knowledge or physical strength,
working with machines or with people or with the earth itself.

All: Together we promise...

One: to bring the full weight of our intelligence and care to our work.

All: Together we promise...

One: to make our place of work a place of safety and respect
for all with whom we labor.

All: Together we refuse...

One: to remain silent, even at the risk of our own security,
when just relations are denied.

All: Together we refuse...

One: to engage in work that harms another, that promotes injustice or violence,
that damages the earth or otherwise betrays the common good.

All: Together we affirm...

One: the rights of all to work that both fulfills and sustains,
to just wages and to contentment, to Sabbath rest and balance.

All: Together we affirm...

One: that the redeeming and transforming power of the Gospel,
with all its demands for justice and its promises of mercy, is as relevant
to the workplace as it is to the sanctuaries of faith and family.

**All: We make these promises, we speak these refusals,
we state these affirmations as offerings to you, O God,
in response to your grace, as symbols of our on-going transformation,
and in hope that one day all the world shall eat and be satisfied.**
