




2021 Annual Stewardship Campaign **An Anchor in Turbulent Times**

Church Board Notes - October 14

Hello FBC community. I miss you all. I am going to get to the part where I tell you what the Board has been up to, but first, I am going to take advantage of my position to communicate more personally to the community that I miss. How is everybody doing?

These are interesting times, that we know. We're in the middle of a presidential election, in a pandemic, shortly after wildfires destroyed quite a chunk of our state. Not easy times for any of us. It's been hard not to let worries and stress drive me to distraction frequently & significantly several times, and that's just today. If you are having a particularly hard time, either because of one of the above reasons, or any other, lean on your FBC family and let us help.

FBC has been an anchor in turbulent times for many years for many people. And it is here for all of us during these turbulent times. The office is open. The building is open sometimes, but phone calls and electronic messages are probably the best way to make contact right now. So feel free to call me, Pastor Erika, the office, or anybody else around here that you feel the need to. I freely speak for your whole community (with a great deal of confidence in my assumptions that I am accurately reflecting it) - we welcome your contact and we want to help.

I'm getting through this time with a lot of help myself, but I have been quite fortunate. I've been blessed with good and supportive management at work, and blessed to still have work. I have been required to work from home for months, which is a mixed blessing, but I cannot complain when so many people do not have work at all. So I am thankful. Debbie and the kids are doing well, all healthy, all managing their modified work/school environments.

Nobody gets through unscathed—Logan is missing his senior year in high school; everybody is missing their friends. But we know that we have been fortunate, so we are available to give more this year and support FBC so it can be an even stronger anchor for those who have not been as fortunate.

If you've been fortunate like me, and want to communicate your ability and willingness to help more, of course we will appreciate that contact. But if you have been less fortunate, and things are hard, we also welcome that opportunity to help and support you. As a church community, we all work together to make FBC the anchor that it is. Sometimes we are in the position of being able to help solidify that support. And sometimes we have need of it ourselves. That is how FBC works, and I appreciate all of you for continuing to keep making that so.

So what was the Board up to at its recent meeting? It's budget time, always challenging to try to prioritize all the good things that the Church wants to accomplish against the resources that we expect to have available, and it is particularly challenging to predict things (an unavoidable part of budgeting) in a rather unpredictable time. We had some productive preliminary discussions, the budget committee is well underway, and the stewardship committee has likely already contacted you. It's an ongoing process. We also had the pleasurable task of admitting a couple of new members, one of my favorite things to do during a Board meeting.

And that's all I have room for this month. Remember, FBC is your community. And it is here for all of us.

CONTUITION:Learning to See as God Sees

A takeaway from the CHAPEL Class's summer read, *Coming Home to Earth*, by Pastor Mark Brocker, St. Andrew Lutheran Church, Beaverton, Oregon

One of the key concepts in my book, *Coming Home to Earth*, is contuition. Contuition is a process of learning to see Earth and all of its inhabitants as God sees them. In writing *Coming Home to Earth*, Genesis 1:31a emerged as a hinge verse, as it expresses how God sees all God has created: "God saw everything that God had made, and indeed, it was very good." The Hebrew word meodh, translated as "very" in the NRSV, actually means "exceedingly." Thus this verse from Genesis affirms that God delighted in Earth and all its inhabitants.

I have become convinced that fear of impending ecological catastrophe is not adequate in itself to motivate us to make the needed radical changes in our way of life. We need to learn to see Earth and all of its inhabitants as God sees them. God's delight in and affection for all God's creatures explains why God grieves deeply with the victims, human and nonhuman, of our ecologically destructive and abusive actions.

The first step in addressing the urgent ecological crisis we face is to see Earth and all of its inhabitants with delight and heartfelt grief. We share this Earth home with them. We are far more likely to make necessary sacrifices for Earth and all its inhabitants if we share in God's delight in and affection for them and recognize them as fellow members of our Earth household

Report from the Endowment Committee

The last meeting of the Committee was July 14th. At it we learned that the value of the Major Maintenance Endowment was \$210,041. So the church continues to make progress in reaching the agreed on \$500,000 goal. Growing this Fund to help with major maintenance is the key task of our group. And, we reviewed all of our responsibilities as outlined in the 6/12/16 Congregational Resolution.

Then we talked about the possibility of eventually hosting a "fun and enjoyable event" for those who would attend and at the same time generate a small amount to add to the Endowment. In all, the group came up with eight different and possible ideas. The intention is to hold such an event when Oregon reaches a normal state re the Virus. We will talk more about this when the Committee meets next.


There was discussion of an earlier gift of 30 shares of stock that will be redeemed quite soon. This gift will add \$12,000 to the Endowment. (As of the end of September the stock was redeemed and the Church received a check for \$12,000. This will be added to the Endowment Fund.)

Now, when we are each at home more and cleaning out closets and drawers and seeing old jewelry, coin collections, antiques, and other valuables, we want you to know that such objects can be donated to the Church to help build the Endowment. The gifting of these valuable objects can have tax benefits for the donor. (Anyone willing to think about such a gift should let a Committee member know.)

Also, we have talked with the Oregon Community Foundation people and they are willing to work with us when a person chooses to give the church a gift of property or other asset, and then receive a guaranteed life income through OCF. Again, we are ready to meet with anyone who might be interested in learning more about this possibility.

That's a brief review of what we have been doing. Finally, we thank you to those who have already given to build the Endowment that will help maintain our church building.

answering the question, "What do these stories mean?" in the context of both the first century and the twenty-first century. They successfully show that the Christmas story, read in its original context, is far richer and more challenging than people imagine. This book will rearrange your mental furniture, in a very good way.

Adam is also Dr. Diesburg, McMinnville's sustainable family dentist, and he spends his free time tending his trees, playing Magic the Gathering with Dash and Griffin, brewing cider, mountain biking, indulging in Emily's DIY house dreams, or just drinking Flag and Wire coffee and enjoying the moment. Emily is the Editor of *Oregon Home* magazine, teaches in the journalism department at Linfield, runs a distance learning school with the children, and writes an occasional essay or two for her pandemic writing project "The Hen is Brooding Again."

We at FBC are so blessed to have this talented, caring family in our community and in our church.

DAVID HALLETT spent his early years on a dairy farm in upstate NY. After earning his BA in English through the State of NY university system, he and his wife, Joy, moved to Ohio where David pursued a law degree at the University of Akron. After that David practiced law for a while in Pennsylvania, while also

teaching law classes part time at Penn State University.



By this time, David had decided that he did not want to continue practicing law but was more interested in a career in higher education. Joy's parents had recently moved to Bend to retire, so Oregon seemed appealing if at least one of them could find a job, which Joy quickly did at the newly-built Willamette Valley Medical Center. That was 1996.

After 10 years in a different higher ed position, David became connected with Chemeketa Community College, where he currently serves as Vice President of Governance and Administration. About that same time, David and Joy were looking for a church with a vibrant children's program for their two daughters, Eliza and Lillian. One Sunday David attended FBC by himself, sitting in the balcony. That Sunday there was a lively discussion of a potential Nicaragua Mission, involving a

possible future trip there, and David remembers that there were a lot of kids running around. That clinched it and began the family's involvement with FBC.

David went on the first FBC AMOS trip to Nicaragua about 2009 and discovered that his love of photography could help share the story of AMOS and La Pimienta with the church and beyond. The very next year, he took his Nicaragua and AMOS passion to Chemeketa and was instrumental in beginning their program of taking groups of students to Nicaragua during spring break, initially for a class called "International Service Learning in Action". His interest in FBC and the Nicaragua Mission has led to his currently sitting on the Board of Directors for AMOS Health and Hope.

During his spare time, David's love of photography sometimes finds him on the street where he does photo portraits of the folks he encounters there. He sees this as a kind of ministry, hearing and sharing stories with them, bringing a sense of humanity to those who happen to be homeless.

An Update from Henderson House

As the Executive Director of Henderson House, I want to express my deep gratitude to all of the incredible donors that have answered our call for help and have given generously to ensure that advocacy services, emergency shelter, and support

groups continue to be available to survivors of domestic and sexual violence in our community especially during these unprecedented times. - Nancy Perez-Flores, Executive Director of Henderson House

Since 1981, Henderson House has served our community, showing up to some of the most difficult situations any of us will ever face with genuine care and transformative resources. One of the most rewarding experiences I have is when a client approaches me in public and I don't recognize them - not because I have forgotten them, but because they have undergone such a transformation in their life that they don't even resemble the person they were when they first reached out to us.

I am so proud of the work we do and of the impact we have on our community. Let me share a bit about that impact. Here are some stats regarding what we were able to accomplish in 2019:

- Total Persons Sheltered: 141
- On-scene Crisis Responses: 28
- Support Group Attendees: 347
- Phone Calls for Support: 809
- Total Nights in Shelter (by # of people): 3,370
- Safety Plan Calls & In-Person Meetings: 971
- Restraining Order Assistance Meetings: 79
- Presentation Attendees: 1,068

In addition, I want to share with you some of the feedback we have received from clients that we served:

"You good folks have been a crucial stepping stone for me and my children to find our way to stability. I am beyond words grateful for all the help, care and support I received. Thank you, thank you for being the miracle that this family needed. God bless each and every one of you for all you good caring work!!"

"Leaving in the middle of the night and jumping on a Greyhound with nothing was one of the scariest things I have ever done. I had no idea what I was doing or even where I was going and it was just plain challenging. Your house and services were just what I needed. Although all that downtime was hard, I realize now that it was really good for me. I needed that time to heal and have a safe environment to be able to fall apart. I really want to thank the advocates for all the time and effort you put into my success! You were so patient with me and I appreciate you! So, thanks again for everything."

These words are echoed again and again by the survivors we serve. The genuine care that they experience comes from a very personal place for each advocate. We meet each client where they are and bring no judgement to our work. Many of us know firsthand the traumas that our clients have endured. I too am a survivor of abuse from my childhood - it is the reason I have dedicated over a decade of service at Henderson House. Helping someone find hope, safety and empowerment is the most rewarding work I can imagine. Thank you again to all of you for your truly meaningful support! - by Nancy Perez-Flores

Since 1967, the Collins Summit (previously the Collins Lecture) has explored the intersection of faith, ethics and public life. They have been a signature event of Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon and its predecessor.

A Family Place (AFP) is the Relief Nursery of Yamhill County, which supports 60 families throughout the county. AFP runs early childhood classrooms, offers parent education, provides basic needs assistance, and more, all from their First Baptist Church location. And they have continued to find new & different ways to do all of this during the pandemic! In the past we've offered these families Boxes of Hope, filled with perishable and non-perishable food and home items, but AFP is currently partnering with YCAP to deliver food boxes to many of their families each week. So, this year, we're doing something new!



As a way to care for these families, a part of our FBC community, we will provide a BAG and a CARD for each family - a Christmas bag filled with \$10 worth of staple items for the home, and a \$20 gift card to help families buy gifts for their children. We hope this will meet a need for these families AND help them give personal, meaningful gifts to one another. Here's how it works!

- + Let Sean know that you want to help, and how many families you want to support.
- For each family:
 - buy \$10 worth of staple items that can't be purchased with food stamps (like toilet paper, laundry detergent, cleaning supplies, soap, zip lock bags, tin foil, paper towels, etc.)
