1867

McMinnville's population is about 300 people. There were 5 stores, 3 blacksmith shops, 2 wagon shops, 1 photographic artist, 1 silversmith, 1 shoe store, 2 doctors, 2 churches and 1 flour mill.

Begun in 1855 by the Campbellite Christians as a high school; tendered to the Baptists for a college in 1856; completed in 1857 at a cost of \$3600; used until 1883; stood where our church building now stands; was L shaped, each wing being 80x30 feet.

Finally, on December 2, 1883, the First Baptist Church met for worship in a building of its own. The new structure was 34 by 54 feet in size, with a tower reaching 65 feet from the ground. The main room, with the pulpit at the south end, seated about 250 people. Under the pulpit was a brick masonry baptismal font, entered through a door in the floor. A year later the church voted to install a gutter on the west side of the building to lead rain water into the baptistry, but nothing was done about heating it. Four windows on each side lighted the building by day, and two large chandeliers illuminated it at night. The outside of the church was finished in rustic, painted a modest yellow with trimmings a neat brown. The building cost \$2100, of which only \$600 remained unpaid at the time of the dedication. Less than half of the 88 members lived near the church. The others included those living in or near Dayton and many whose whereabouts were unknown.







In 1926 the church issued bonds that could be purchased by the congregation and community members to help build a new church building. This is an alternative way of financing versus a mortgage. Instead of borrowing from a bank, the church borrowed from the community. Each bond had a value of \$500 and paid 6% interest to the bond holder. The bond was paid back 20 years later, on May 15, 1946.



New Annex To Be Open For Visitors

Dedication ceremonies for the newly completed Christian Education Building at the Mc-Minnville First Baptist Church were scheduled for Sunday, May 24 at 7:30 p.m. Ceremonies will be held in the new chapel.

Dedication speaker will be The Reverend Doctor Ray Schaefer, state director of Christian Education for the Oregon Baptist Convention.

The \$100,000 building is designed to teach children the meaning of Christ, a church spokesman said. Its entire bottom floor is a pre-school unit which will serve children from the cribthrough five years of age.

Features of the unit include a complete nursery with toddler space as well as a crib room. One-way windows make it possible for parents to observe their children without disturbing them. Ozone lamps purify the air and eliminate odors and individual room heating units mix the proper amount of fresh air in each room. A sanitary diaper changing table and sink unit highlights the crib room.

All pre-school rooms have access to adjacent tollet facilities built in height to the size of the children. Bright colors make for better learning conditions.

Second floor of the new building will house first and second grade class rooms, a chapel capable of seating 100 persons, a multi-purpose room for classes, a reception or extended foyer. Adult rest rooms and a small kitchen complete the floor plan.

Toy Box Day Care to note 25th year

t was 25 years ago this month that Evangeline Smith started the Toy Box Day Care ministry at First Baptist Church.

It began with 18 children and a director who also did the teaching, cooking and dishwashing.

As Smith recalled, "I would open the center in the early mornings, have class and then at noon we all marched upstairs with our crayons and coloring books while the meal was prepared.

"It didn't take long for that to change as the numbers of children increased. More teachers and a cook were hired," she said.

Smith, who has been involved with Toy Box since its inception, taught school in South Dakota before moving to a ranch and rearing her three children. She then moved to McMinnville and soon after started Toy Box.

Today Tox Box has an enrollment of 60 children in its day care-preschool combination program, which includes before and after school care.

It is licensed to care for children from age 30 months to 14 years. It averages about 50 children a day.

In its 25 years, Toy Box has had 10 directors. The present director, Yvonne Ewoldt, has been on board for one year. She came to McMinnville six years ago from Iowa with her husband and three children. She has been working in early childhood education for four years.

Its preschool program is designed to prepare children from age 2½ to kindergarten with the social and academic skills they will need in future school years, according to Ewoldt, who oversees a staff of four teachers, a nutritionist/cook and an alternate cook, plus teacher assistants.

Working with Ewoldt on staff are Judy Christianson, program supervisor and head teacher of the 3- and 4-year-olds; Lillian Woods, head teacher of the 2- and 3-year-olds; Toni Lockwood, teacher of the 4- and 5-year-olds; Michele Wetten, teacher; Anne Engen, cook, and Kay Morgan, alternate cook.

Teacher's assistants are Charlette Dragoo, Tami Knapp, Lara Sheridan, Jenny Blevins, Kathy Ewoldt and Piper Wenderlich. o celebrate its silver anniversary, a dinner is planned Saturday at 7 p.m. in Jake's Deli banquet room. Tickets are \$6.95 per person, available at Toy Box and the First Baptist Church office. Six of the 10 directors will be honored.

Besides Smith and Ewoldt, the others are Virginia Lauseng, Diane Hodges, Gayle Blank Rodriguez, Sara Miller, Sue Durand, Barbara Muller-Kowing, Carolyn Franklin and Judy Stuck.

Toy Box staff also will be recognized at the Sunday morning worship service at First Baptist Church, 125 S. Cowls St.

An open house at Toy Box, which is located in the Educational Building of First Baptist on First Street, is scheduled Sunday from 1 to 3 p.m.

"We invite all families of Toy Box, past and present, former staff members and the public," said Ewoldt.

Toy Box is managed by a committee headed by Donna Sayre, chairperson. Other members are Nona Ballard, Rhoda Robbins and Smith.

Baptists in time-travel mode

McMINNVILLE — The entire congregation of First Baptist Church will be taking a trip Sunday through both time and distance.

The occasion is the 125th anniversary of the church, which began its meetings in the Linfield College chapel in 1867.

A re-enactment of the events of the church's founding will be featured at the 11 a.m. service. But first, the congregation will travel by car convoy to the South Yamhill Cemetery, the site of the church's first building.

Cars will leave the church parking lot at 9:30 a.m. for the four-mile trip.

After a brief service at a historical marker in the cemetery, some shrubbery will be planted there and some dirt taken up to plant another bush at the First Baptist Church site, 125 S. Cowls St.

Back at the Cowls Street site, in

the 1926 California mission-style building, members of the congregation will portray the organizing meeting of the church.

To get into the 125-year mood, the current pastor, the Rev. Bernie Turner, is growing a Lincolnesque beard and encouraging other men in the congregation to join in. Both men and women are invited to wear period dress, and women will be sporting hats.

Turner's list of parishioners who will be honored for 40 or more years of membership in the church has 60 names on it. Two of those people, Marguerite Christensen and C. Bernard Hansard, have been in the congregation for 77 years, since 1915.

At a reception following the service, some large pieces of church history memorabilia — such as pulpit chairs from a past generation — will be on display in the social hall.

Several former pastors are expected at another special service the following Sunday, May 17. They include Jack Kiekel, Evertt Ward and James Hughes.

The sermon that day will be delivered by the Rev. Harold Bjornson, who served the church from 1958 through 1967, the church's centennial year.


The church settled at its present location in 1883, building a meeting house with a 65-foot tower. It and a subsequent church were torn down as they became too small for the growing congregation.

First Baptist Church is celebrating its anniversary this year with a variety of activities. A show of art created by church members was well-received in April. A display of historic photos continues.

Still to come is an all-church picnic in August. In September, two events are scheduled: an all-church retreat, and a song and poetry festival.





The shape of the Anniversary logo is a pinwheel made with triangles. It speaks of a pioneer spirit in some ways – a reminder of wagon-wheels that brought our forefathers to this valley. We might think of it as a willingness to follow the leading of God's Spirit.. The shapes matter, of course, but the colors do, too.

Purple and green triangles represent time. In the liturgical year, purple is the color of Advent and Lent – of sacred times. Green is the color of what we call Ordinary time – the long non-holiday season. Those two triangles together stand for the continuity, the all-the-time-ness of our faith community.

The red and yellow at the top – the triangles reaching high- to be evocative of the Holy Spirit. They're the colors of fire, of Pentecost, that day when we celebrate that the spirit is for all people. And red is the color of theology at an academic institution. So, these triangles hint at spirit and at learning and our commitments to open-mindedness and scholarship.

The blue and green triangles reaching out, are designed to evoke water and land. The colors of our planet. They call us to remember the wide reach of this church: our support of missions and development projects around the globe, our desire that our worship and our work would empower us to nurture peace and justice and abundance throughout the world.

The browns at the bottom, dig deep. They're the dirt of this place, the ways our mission and our work is also centered locally, even in our own neighborhood. The brown is the base, the foundation of being in community together and the freedom to grow that being grounded provides us.



FIRST BAPTIST MARKS SESQUICENTENNIAL



McMinnville congregation — among the area's oldest — has grown along with city

he universe, poet Muriel Rukeyser observed, is not made of atoms. It is made of stories.

As the congregation at McMinnville's First Baptist Church celebrates their church's 150th anni-

versary, the Rev. Erika Marksbury thinks a lot about stories these days. "The church is one way to share God's story, but so are all of our lives," she said

Marksbury, who serves as the church's pastor, has placed a recorder in the church so congregants can drop by and share their stories. Each month, a different question is posed.

Responses can be personal stories, or they can be stories of people's experiences with the church. They all add to the ongoing 150-year-old story that is the First Baptist Church.

"History is not just something that happened in the past," Marksbury said. "It is the continuing saga of our lives."

The saga of the First Baptist Church is intimately connected with the history of McMinnville and Linfield College, as all three developed together.

The city was founded in 1856 by William T. Newby, who named it after his hometown in Tennessee. And it quickly drew 300 residents.

It seemed to be the place to be, said Charles Walker, a former Linfield president and longtime member of the church. "There was definitely a sense that McMinnville was growing," he

In the late 1850s, Sebastian Adams began pushing for the siting of a college in McMinnville, and Newby donated six acres for the venture.

Adams tried for a year and a half to run the school himself, but couldn't make a go of it. He suggested turning it over to the Baptist Church's educational arm, which had the means to provide sufficient support.

The school was chartered by the Oregon Territorial Legislature in 1858 as the Baptist College at McMinnville. It later became McMinnville College, and, eventually, Linfield College.

The college's first president, the Rev. George C. Chandler, began holding Sunday school services in college quarters, as they were not being used on Sundays. That led to the founding of First Baptist on May 11, 1867, and it continued conducting services in the original college building — located on the present site of the church, at the corner of First and Cowls — until 1883.

The church's first facility of its own was located next to a cemetery off McCabe Road. But little or no evidence of that structure remains.

"There was a building there, but it was taken apart piece by piece to make a church for another congregation at the coast," Walker said.

The college eventually outgrew the Cowls site and moved onto more expansive acreage to the southeast.

The church inherited the college's



original wooden building. It later burned, but Walker said, "The foundation was visible when we added to the building."

Linfield and First Baptist Church have a certain chicken-and-the-egg

relationship, Walker said.

"There are some people who say the college created the church," he said. "There are others who say the church created the college.

"In the end, of course, it really doesn't matter. Religion and education have a long history of being intertwined in the community."

In fact, the name Linfield comes from a Baptist minister — the Rev. George Fisher Linfield. The college was named in his honor in 1922, after his widow, Frances Eleanor Ross Linfield, made a handsome donation in his memory to promote Christian education.

While Linfield is no longer formally associated with First Bantist, many members, like Walker, boast college connections.

Marksbury said the congregation is extremely proud of its shared heritage with the school. "The church kept that early commitment to education and the deepening of faith through learning and inquiry," she said.

First Baptist has been heavily involved in many aspects of the community over the past 150 years. The church served as the first headquarters of Habitat for Humanity and helped launch the local effort to provide affordable housing for struggling families.

The church continues to provide space for A Family Place, a relief nursery for children organized by Lutheran Community Services, and the McMinnville Free Clinic. Along with six other churches in the community, it offers shelter for the homeless through the Community Winter Inclement Shelter Help program.

Member Tim Duerfeldt, a retired Chemeketa Community College instructor, said almost 20 addiction recovery and support groups meet at the church on a weekly basis. He said the church also hosts Scout meetings and Saturday breakfasts.

Giving is part of the church's DNA, Duerfeldt said. "That goes back to the very beginning in this original village of 300 people.

Music minister J.P. Bierly said he's not sure where First Baptist ranks in terms of the community's oldest congregations. But of the

city's 52 churches, representing 37 denominations, it is certainly "one of the oldest," he said.

In 1883, the church put up a new building. That building was replaced 1898, and again in 1927 with a structure featuring a 6,000pipe organ.

The 1927 structure still stands. A new education wing was added in 1964, and another renovation and expansion was undertaken in the late 1990s.

Church members are planning a series of events to celebrate their 150th anniversary. In keeping with the theme of stories, author Brian Doyle will visit at 7 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 3.

The church is also hosting a series of concerts showcasing assorted musical styles.

The Darrell Grant Trio will perform a jazz concert at 4 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 20. The church's choir will be joined by outside musicians in performing a Christmas concert at 7 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 4. A contemporary concert featuring We Three, siblings Joshua, Bethany and Manny Humlie, follows at 7 p.m. Friday, Jan. 20.

The Gould Piano Trio has a classical concert set for 7 p.m. Wednesday, March 29. A concert formally celebrating the church's 150th anniversary is slated for 7 p.m. Saturday, May 13. The series will conclude on Oct. 14, 2017, with a 7 p.m. organ concert featuring Paul Klemme, organist at St. Paul's Episcopal in Salem.

Duerfeldt said none of the concerts will be expressly religious in nature, and no collections will be taken.







150th Logo - Its meaning

"In quilting, the pinwheel is a symbol of migration, of movement and adaption across space and time. Because of FBC's long history with quilting — and because of our long history, and adaptation, growth, and change over the last 150 years —

we chose the pinwheel as a symbol of our anniversary year. The shape of the symbol tells a story, but so do the colors.

The **purple** and **green** triangles represent FBC's enduring faithfulness. Purple is the liturgical color for holy seasons, Lent and Advent, those times when we say God comes near. Green is the color for 'ordinary time' - most of the church year, when we focus on living out the lives God calls us to. These triangles speak to our commitment in all times, however 'holy' or 'ordinary' they are.

The **red** and **yellow** triangles that point upward remind us of the Spirit - they're the colors of Pentecost, when the Spirit came to all the people, old and young, male and female, dreamers, and visionaries. These triangles remind us that the Spirit is with us, inspiring and enlivening our work together. Red is also the academic color for theology, and so it hints at our commitment to being a learning congregation.

Next, the blue and green triangles evoke a global feel, and remind us of our connections to projects and people in Mexico, Nicaragua, Latin America, the Congo, and beyond. They remind us that God's love, peace, and justice are not limited by boundaries and that our call is - and has long been - to share all of that far and wide.

Lastly, two triangles in shades of **brown** point downward. This section of the pinwheel reminds us of dirt, and that we are first and foremost a local church, deeply rooted in the community of McMinnville. So much about our location makes us who we are and determines our mission and outreach commitments."


