Church Board Notes, August 9th

The Church Board met as scheduled on August 9th, in person. We started off with a devotion by Kathleen Verigin. She shared some thoughts on leadership from Irish poet, John O'Donahue. These include helpful tips like "Act out of service," "Be hospitable to criticism," "Work on yourself," "Be gracious in the face of others' failure or disappointment," and embrace the "wisdom of deep listening."

We heard the team reports from each of the Board members. In the Treasurer's Report, Don Watson shared that the church has been down on revenue, year to date, but that expenses have been down as well, which has allowed us to remain "in the black" for the year so far.

The Board discussed some recent incidents that have resulted in one individual being trespassed from Church property. While we try our best to accommodate all those who seek our help, there are some actions that we simply cannot tolerate, and unfortunately the only remaining solution is to get law enforcement involved. We also discussed "compassion fatigue" among some of our members and volunteers.

The Board heard an update on the Support for Immigrant Families group (MRC-McMinnville Refugee Coalition). There will be a fundraiser concert on September 23rd featuring Nancy McCann and friends. We will also host an informational lecture on Ukraine during the week of September 11 (more details about both of these events on page 8). There will also be a

fundraiser dinner sometime in October. Finally, the family will arrive on August 22nd. Thanks to all who have helped bring all the resources together for them.

Pastor Erika reported that she submitted the application to the Community Consulting Project. If we are accepted, we will receive assistance in our strategic planning process at a significant discount compared to the consultants' usual rates.

Under New Business, Steve Howard shared the idea of holding a car raffle to raise funds to buy a wheelchair bus to help us bring our friends to service on Sundays. In an email, Sean mentioned that the Mac Youth Collective would also use a bus if it was available.

The second item of New Business was a request to consider updating our restroom use and signage to be more welcoming to those with non-conforming gender identities. We had some discussion, and we hope that you will share your feedback on this topic with us.

We will reach out to the community from the Courtyard during Farmers Market on August 17th from 11am - 5pm (creating Hope & Prayer Flags). The last event is Sept. 21st, hosted by Climate Action. Please stop by if you are available.

Finally, our next Board meeting will be held at 6:30pm on Wednesday, September 13th in person in the FBC second floor conference room. Guests are always welcome at Church Board meetings, so please email me at gbdlinor@gmail.com if you would like to attend.

Then the team identified the following action items:

- 1. Reducing the use of harmful chemicals in our homes, specifically putting together a booklet on non toxic cleaners.
- 2. Inviting a speaker from Recology and hosting a gathering at FBC with other churches.
- 3. Discontinuing the use of single use plastics at FBC.
- 4. Making sure everyone who uses our spaces knows where to recycle, and what is appropriate to recycle.
- 5. Encouraging ourselves and church family to eat a low carbon diet.
- 6. Continuing to educate FBC about environmental values, specifically advocating to discontinue the use of GMOs.
- 7. Continuing to educate ourselves about indigenous values and how we can put them into action.
- 8. Advocating for local and national issues by sending relevant emails to team members for taking action.

This one is from Lynn Crowell who says, "This recipe has become a crowd favorite that I make for potlucks. Meatless but very flavorful."

Slow-Cooker Southwestern Pot Pie

Ingredients:

2 TBs olive oil, divided1 small onion, chopped1 medium carrot, chopped1 bell pepper, chopped

2 garlic cloves, minced 1 C. Fresh or frozen corn kernels

3 Cs cooked pinto beans 1 jalapeno chile, minced

3/4 C. Vegetable stock 1 TB tamari, 2 Tbs fresh cilantro, S&P

Saute onion and carrot in a skillet with a little olive oil until soft. Lightly oil 3 1/2- 4 quart crockpot, add all vegetables & beans. Cook 5 hours on slow, then turn up to High. Make a favorite cornbread recipe and spoon over top of beans and vegetables. Cook on High for 1 hour.

Getting to Know your First Baptist Church Family



Linette & Paul Studebaker

Linette was born in Waterloo, Iowa, but her family moved to Fruitland, Idaho when she was three years old. She was the eldest of five children. She grew up in Fruitland on a farm, her father being a farmer and her mom a school-teacher. Her family worshipped at the Church of the Brethren. After graduating from H.S., Linette went to southern California to attend college at the University of La Verne, which was historically a Church of the Brethren college. It was there she met Paul in the choir, a traveling choir, which gave them many opportunities to get well-acquainted. Linette was a Biology Major and studied for a 5th year to get her Teaching Credential, as well.

Meanwhile, Paul was born in San Francisco, growing up alongside a brother and sister. His dad was a Church of the Brethren pastor, and later taught High School. His parents divorced when he was seven years old; he and his brother stayed with their dad, and their sister went with their mom. When Paul was twelve years old, his dad remarried; his stepmom was also a High School teacher. After Paul graduated from H.S., he headed off to the University of La Verne. He received his Liberal Arts Degree in Speech and later received his Masters in Applied Psychology.

Paul and Linette married in 1971. They lived in various places after college, including Costa Mesa, CA, Wenatchee, WA, and Tonasket, WA, where their only child, a daughter, Elaine was born in 1975. Elaine was born with multiple birth defects. When she was 3, the family moved back to Fruitland, Idaho to be near better medical care and to be near family. Paul and Linette bought an apple orchard and Paul farmed and Linette taught in Head Start.

The family moved to McMinnville in 1990, so Elaine could attend an excellent private Special Ed. school in Ballston they had heard about. Elaine has done very well and has been on her own since H.S., living independently.

Paul worked for Yamhill County Mental Health for 19 years, retiring in 2009. He has volunteered with the Native Plant Society, 1,000 Friends of Yamhill, Co, and was instrumental in starting The NW Earth Institute. Paul is passionate about Climate Change, and has spent years researching and writing about it, while looking for solutions to this very real problem.

After moving to McMinnville, Linette worked as a Head Start Director and later worked part time at Linfield in their Adult College Degree Program. She retired in 2012 and has volunteered as a Hospice Worker, was a member of the Yamhill County Parks Board, worked at A Family Place and the Aspire Program in the H.S., helping students get ready for college. Linette enjoys watercolor painting. She loves to read and is a Master Gardner. Both she and Paul love the outdoors and were avid campers and hikers in their earlier days. Now they say they "Motel Camp", still enjoying nature.

The Studebakers found FBC when they first moved to McMinnville in 1990. They had met with Bernie Turner, and found out we were a Progressive Christian Church, which is what they were looking for. They both enjoy Faith and Java, and Linette has been with Sister Circle many years. They say they stay connected to FBC because this is their church, and this is where many of their friends attend as well. We are grateful for this couple and all they bring to us. Thank You.

Getting to Know your First Baptist Church Family

Judy Larmouth

Judy moved here from Green Bay, WI about 2 years ago to be near her son Dave, whom we know as our church moderator. You will often see the two of them sitting on the piano side of the sanctuary on Sunday mornings.

Born and raised in Duluth, MN, Judy met her husband, Don, at the University of MN, Duluth, from where she earned her teaching degree. After marrying and teaching awhile in Minnesota, the couple moved to Green Bay, WI, where Judy taught, mostly 4th grade, for 40 years, 35 of which were in the same school. Meanwhile Don was a linguistics professor. Judy and Don had 2 children-- Dave, and a daughter, Mary Margaret, who lives in St. Paul, MN. There are also three grandchildren--all girls.

In 2001, Judy retired from teaching, after her husband was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease. She says that the next 10 years or so were very hard. He died in 2013. Then in 2014, Judy, herself, was diagnosed with Parkinson's, which is the reason she now needs a walker or walking sticks to navigate. Her children decided that Judy would benefit from living close to one of them and Dave provided the best option. Obviously moving here from the Midwest has been a big adjustment for Judy. Not only leaving her friends and her dog, but the winter rains get to her! And she misses the snow. But she is making friends at Vineyard Heights, in her local PEO chapter, and in her Parkinson's exercise group.

Visiting Dave at least annually, Judy would attend FBC. So when she moved here, she already knew about our church and that it felt comfortable to her. Back in Green Bay she had been active in the Union Congregational/ United Church of Christ. When asked what appeals to her about FBC, she says it's the honesty, purposes, social involvement, and Erika's reaching out to her. Judy joined FBC in 2022 and is currently the church Archivist and is getting involved with welcoming the Ukrainian family, possibly using her ESL skills to help them with a new language.

During her earlier life, Judy and her husband, and sometimes Judy on her own, did a lot of traveling. Apparently during many of these trips, husband Don took advantage of his love of fishing, trying his hand in the lakes and streams of various countries. Judy's traveling days may not yet be over since, this last April, she and BJ, her daughter-in-law, went on the group trip that Kathleen Verigin led to Scotland. Way to go, Judy!

As far as what Judy enjoys in her spare time, she puts reading at the top of the list, especially historical fiction and mysteries with a historical connection. And she enjoys PBS television. She also knits, especially small project like baby hats (because they don't take so long!).

We are fortunate indeed to welcome Judy Larmouth into our fellowship. She is an interesting and valuable addition to our congregation.

The family of six is multigenerational: <u>Alex</u>, father of 2 year old <u>Arthur</u>, and husband of <u>Ira</u>; Ira has a daughter named <u>Kristina</u>; Ira's mother, <u>Olga</u> and brother Ivan complete the family.

MRC has found the family a lovely rental home. The brother, Ivan, will stay with a McMinnville family close-by for several weeks until all are settled.

MRC furnished their home with all the donations from many people from the community and especially from MacHub/Swede Mom, and the Habitat For Humanity ReStore. The home now has beds, dressers, sofas, rugs, end tables, lamps, and a fully equipped kitchen. Many friends from our church family have helped supply items and helped move and arrange furniture.

At this point, their only need is to have a car, either on loan or as a gift. If you have any leads, please contact JoAnn or Larry Sims, (425) 802-7220, <u>joanncsims@gmail.com</u>.

The first several weeks after their arrival will be spent adjusting to their new home and surroundings. The coalition is assisting them in completing paper work for assistance programs, establishing a doctor and learning about pharmacies and medical needs, discovering where grocery stores are located, as well as introducing them to our city library. Our own Judy Larmouth has volunteered to be their ESL teacher and will work with them to be more comfortable using English. Lynn Crowell organized a "first home cooked meal" for the family during their first week in McMinnville. The working members of the family plan on looking for work as soon as they are established. If you have any job leads, pass them onto Larry or JoAnn.

The MRC is appreciative of everyone's assistance and wishes of welcome for the Ukrainian family. We hope you will continue to support and welcome the family by attending and participating in upcoming benefit programs this fall.

It was a fun, educational, and transformative trip for all of us, and we are excited to share about our time there and figure out ways to continue to be connected with and supportive of the native people we came to know people and care for. A Reflection on the Service Learning Trip from Rebecca Arredondo

Hello, my name is Rebecca Arredondo. I attend McMinnville Cooperative Ministries and this summer I had the opportunity to go with the McMinnville Youth Collective on a SLAM trip. Part of my interest in going on this trip was because my son was going, and part was because of my job. I work in Willamina School District where I am currently an Attendance Family Advocate and was previously a teacher. This grant funded position enables me to work in partnership with the school district, families and the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde. I have learned so much about our local tribe over the last 17+ years and this trip was an opportunity to learn more about other tribes in our area. I was also very excited to go with my son Adrian and see how the activities and experiences we were going to take part in would impact all of our youth.

The biggest highlight has to be the connections and relationships built not only within our group of youth, but also between the youth groups there and with the SLAM staff and others who joined us throughout the week. I was continuously impressed with the thoughts and reflections our youth had during our small group gathering times as we processed what we'd seen and learned. I thoroughly enjoyed having Owen and AJ on my cleaning crew, making moccasins with my son, Adrian, watching the youth play card games, Mafia, or dance their hearts out on the Wii (especially Adrian and Owen with Dash and others joining at times). I enjoyed our conversations in the van with Tayah and Oscar, especially about where plants should or should not be growing and the placement of windows in a house. And the pure that joy filled the van as we all sang to songs together on "Boy Band Monday," "Diva Tuesday" and "Disney Thursday" on our way to and from the worksite. I'm so impressed with how hard everyone worked at the house to clean up the yard and make it look nice. (Thank goodness there was a big tree there that shaded us most of the time and it wasn't 100 degrees!)

There were so many lovely joy-filled, God present moments, but as I neared the end of the week, I discovered what was going to be a big impact or take-away for me on this trip. As it turned out, it did not have to do with the boarding schools we learned about, or the history of how reservations came to be, or the atrocities conducted on the indigenous peoples of this land. It ended up being something we all have a part in in our everyday lives and all around the world. What I'm going to share with you next is a moment of yaych' unakl (y-eye-ch' oo-nock + the sound made when you put the tongue at the top of your mouth behind your teeth and breath out) for me—which is the Sahaptin, or Ichishkiin (the Yakama Nation's language) word for courage.

On Thursday, the last full work day, as I took my morning walk around the building before breakfast, I finished listening to Robin Wall Kimmerer's book "Braiding Śweetgrass" (which I highly recommend to anyone, especially in audio book form). She talks a lot about relationship and reciprocity with each other, the land and living beings that share the earth with us. How two-leggeds, humans, were put on this earth as protectors of the land and life; to live in reciprocity with the land, never take more than we need, always offer gratitude and thanks, and to speak up for those animals and plants who cannot speak for themselves. Yakama Nations' legends and stories shared with us during the week also talked of us as protectors of the land. And so, on Thursday as I finished "Braiding Sweetgrass" and reflected on the week, a felt an ache building in my heart. There was no option for recycling while we were there, there was no separation between yard debris and trash at the site, there were plastic forks and spoons tossed at the end of each of our shared meals. I did what I could to minimize my addition to the trash by rewashing and reusing the plastic ware and sandwich bags throughout the week. I even saved some students' paper lunch bags that hadn't been thrown away and had them reuse them the next day. I ferreted away empty bread bags and tabs that I could bring back home to recycle in the special recycling events organized by First Baptist and the Unitarian church. But at that final day at the worksite, it was very hard to see the mountain of trash bags going to the dump. Let me emphasize that in no way is this a reflection on the people whose house we helped clean up. We all add to the world's dump heaps; sometimes in larger amounts, sometimes in smaller. My sadness came from reflecting on how the colonialist culture that was brought to this land, and which we are all a part of today, is all about altering the land to suit our needs and consuming and buying things that are easily disposable, to minimize work for ourselves. It doesn't take into account the land and life that we are surrounded by or what we are setting the world up to be in the future; how our trash and consumption as a society, all in the name of progress and ease, has altered our world so much that there may not be time to turn it around. We are at a turning point. Can we restore our world to balance and reciprocity? Or are we already at the point of no return? I felt heartbroken and helpless. All of my emotions, aided by sleep deprivation, came pouring out Thursday evening during our Open Circle service and in our small group times.

I left the week feeling very happy to have gone with such an amazing group and having provided such a service to an elderly couple, who could never have cleaned their yard on their own, but also with a lot to reflect on and process as I contemplate how I can have an even greater impact on the world around me for environmental justice and reciprocity. My family does a lot already to minimize our footprint on the world, but I know there is more we can do. There is more we must all do if we are to preserve and protect our world for generations to come. All tribes have a way of thinking that focuses on connecting the past to the present and future, often within the number seven. You think back to past generations, understand your place in the current generation and look ahead to future generations, making sure that what you're doing will be beneficial to those that come after you. It's going to take a lot of work for us to make sure that the world is a good place to live for the two-legged, the four-legged, the winged ones and the ones that swim and crawl, seven generations into the future. It can be done, but not without a lot of change.

OK, I know I got deep there, but that's what can happen on these kinds of trips; you go to provide service for others with an open heart to God and come out having been changed in unexpected ways. Thank you for reading this and letting me be vulnerable with you in a moment of yaych' unakl. As I continue to move forward from this week, I will remain open to the ways in which God can use me to help restore the world and all creation to God's loving embrace. Thank you.

Leadership Education aims to create lasting change in U.S. congregations by supporting Christian leaders and the institutions they serve. Leadership Education designs educational services, develops intellectual resources and facilitates networks of institutions that cultivate a coherent vision of Christian institutional leadership and form Christian leaders. Leadership Education is a non-degree-granting initiative of Duke Divinity School funded by Lilly Endowment Inc. and based in Durham, N.C.

We have been selected to receive a Reflective Leadership Grant from Leadership Education at Duke Divinity. These grants of up to \$15,000 support an opportunity for structured reflection for leaders of Christian organizations that are advancing their mission in the midst of today's rapidly changing context. Thirty-one Christian leaders from a variety of faith-based organizations are funded in this third year of the Reflective Leadership Grant program.

"The Reflective Leadership Grant at Leadership Education at Duke Divinity recognizes and supports the faithful and innovative work of lay and ordained Christian leaders who find themselves at a pivotal moment in their ministry," says Mycal Brickhouse, a director of program and grants at Leadership Education. "Using Harvard professor Ron Heifetz's language, we want to help leaders experience 'balcony time,' which allows them to move from the dance floor to the balcony to gain a broader picture of the work, organization, community and trends. We want to encourage grantees to continue to develop their leadership capacities in ways specific to their work and context. For some, this might look like attending interdisciplinary conferences; for others it might look like observing similar work in different settings. We are excited about the interest in this grant program from both traditional and non-traditional Christian leaders. We look forward to learning alongside them and their communities."
