Church Board Notes, October 11th

The Church Board met as scheduled on September 11th in person.

Mary Dressel shared a devotion from Donna Ashworth's book Wild Hope. The poem "Joy Chose You" says that joy sneaks in, cares nothing for your messy home, so you must be ready when she appears.

There are still some spots available for the All-Church retreat at Camp Arrah Wanna on October 20th - 22nd.

Kathleen shared that FBC will host a First Aid/CPR class at the church on Saturday, November 4th (time TBA). This two-hour course will help you learn the basics of first aid, CPR, and AED devices. Erika shared that our shelter volunteers will receive training on mental health first aid from County staff.

The Board discussed options and decided the Matthew 25 group should report to the Missions team for regular business, and directly to the Board for any pressing matters of concern.

Don Watson shared the Financial Report, and our blessings continued for another month. Thank you for all the ways that you support FBC. Don shared a comparison of our current budget compared to 2015. One area that needs some exploration is the idea of bringing back fundraisers to help raise funds for some of our "wants" as the regular budget must cover our "needs".

Climate Action - November's Recipe of the month: Burmese Style TOFU

Ingredients:

- 1 cup dried red or yellow lentils, red Mung beans (or other small beans) rinsed well
- 3 cups boiling water
- 3/4 teaspoon Salt
- Optional: If you want to add spices, a savory option is to stir in 3/4 tsp onion powder and 3/4 tsp garlic powder to the mash before cooking.

Leaving the Tofu plain allows more options for using in different recipes. Since it's already cooked, you can add to salads with no need for reheating, or add it at the end of a stir fry,

I like to add a piece of Kombu (kelp) to beans while soaking, which adds minerals and aids digestion. Soak beans a bit longer (reduce the salt to 1/4 tsp).

Instructions for making Tofu:

- 1. Cover beans with boiling water in a Pyrex or other heat resistant bowl, and soak beans for at least 30 minutes.
- 2. Place beans, soaking water and salt in blender, blend until smooth.
- 3. Pour mixture into a large saucepan.
- 4. Heat on low until it is very thick; remove from heat.
- 5. Using a spatula, pour into an 8"x8" baking dish. Smooth the top, and place in the refrigerator to cool for a couple of hours.
- Once the Tofu is set and cooled, it will easily slip out of the dish. Cut into cubes or slices, and store in a glass container for use later (or add some as a bean paste to a favorite recipes).

She greeted us at the former elementary school transformed into a plank house.



She spent 2 hours talking about the two exhibits, Shimkhen and The Forest.



Shimkhen is a historical figure important to Grand Ronde tribes. She/he was "two spirit", a shaman, and healer who lived in the 1800's. You can make an offering of tobacco and listen to his power song, recorded on a wax cylinder.

We also saw beautiful carving and artwork, and the canoe used with other Northwest tribes on their

canoe journey down the coast. She answered our many questions. We learned the indigenous names for trees such as ant'wat (Douglas fir) and K'anawi-stik (Oregon White Oak).

There will be a new Forest exhibit for each season.

We ended the day with a delicious lunch at the Chinese restaurant in the casino.

I have just returned from Central America, where I accompanied a team of leaders from RECONPAZ (Red Continental Cristiana por la Paz) on a three-nation immersion trip to/with indigenous leaders from various indigenous groups. We visited several remote communities in El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras, and my extended time in the back of pick-up trucks on long dusty bumpy dirt roads was just about as much as I could handle. (Reconpaz is a Pan-American Christian network of native American organizations struggling for justice and peace, especially in areas where the lives, communities, water, land rights and well-being of indigenous peoples are being threatened by the incursion of large-scale mining, petroleum and agricultural projects.)





are disappearing.

These people are standing up against forces with economic power far beyond their resources, and they have been paying the price, as dozens of leaders from these communities and others like them have been silenced, murdered or disappeared over the last several years. Yet they fight on and have won some limited successes. In each country, they are fighting against not only multi-national interests, but also the local and national government leaders who are in their pockets.

Earlier this year I had the opportunity to travel to Ecuador with Reconpaz leaders in both the heights of the Andes and in the Amazon Jungle. In the Andes we hiked with Quechua activists to several remote villages to hear the stories of their desperate fight to preserve their water supply from Canadian mining companies. The scars in the land and the contamination of their water was evident all around us. In

the Amazon, the threats come from oil drilling and palm oil plantations. As we were able to get beyond the burning fires and the clear-cut forests, we accompanied a Siekopai leader on a several hour hike into this dense lush green forest. She knew the forest so intimately and described in detail the practical and medicinal uses of each plant. Even as it seemed that this section of rainforest had hardly been touched by human beings, she described all the ways that the encroachment of civilization has impacted her forest home. The animals are mostly

gone, the water is polluted and the birds that once filled the air

The people are leaving too. Into the cities, or across borders. There are fewer and fewer native peoples with this ancestral



knowledge, and fewer and fewer people who can defend what is left of their lands. My interest in these trips goes beyond the obvious need to protect our planet. It is also because I wanted to understand why so many people are leaving these areas and joining the streams of migrants looking for new places where they can live. It is one more part of the journey I have been on for the last two years. I have spent several weeks on the highways of Colombia, walking with Venezuelan migrants, hearing their stories, laughing and sharing bread and mangoes. I have gone to Darien, the jungle between Colombia and Panama which every migrant describes as the most horrifying part of the journey, and sat with Haitian sisters and Cameroonian brothers whose loved ones didn't survive. And I have accompanied caravans from Honduras on the road, and received others as they arrived in Tijuana, looking for a place to rest until they are permitted to knock on our southern door to ask for asylum. In all these places, there are amazing faith leaders (and others) who are accompanying and providing for these migrants. A big part of my job is to come alongside them and see how we can strengthen their ministries.

International Ministries has a project page, "A Mile in their Shoes" which is there to raise support for these ministries. But another big part of my job to share these stories with you and our US churches. I have become so incredibly disheartened at the reaction in the US to the plight of the least of these in our world. I have walked a tiny, tiny, tiny fraction of what these people

have walked and I can't begin to imagine the courage, strength and desperation that they have had to make it this far. And it is devastating to me when I hear so many good Christians say that we have no place here for them.

When I advocate for a better asylum policy and for our churches to sponsor asylum seekers, one of the replies I often get is, "why don't they stay in their home countries and make them better?" My answer to this question comes from my latest experiences in Central America. I bear witness to the struggle of indigenous people to make their homelands better, to make OUR world better. I bear witness to the threats, to the beatings, to the disappearances, to the murders that they have endured. I bear witness to the theft and destruction of their lands and the contamination of their water. They are trying with everything they have, but the powers they face are much greater than they have the reserves to face. These powers are not of their making. In fact, the powers they are facing and the interests they serve come much more directly from our world than they do from theirs.

I see my role as a pastor to the displaced. They are the tired, the poor, the huddled masses; they are in large part the indigenous, those which no country seems to value as much as we value what we can take from them. In as much as God said "welcome the stranger," I also see OUR role as pastor to the displaced. I ask that God help us all to see that too.


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
