# Visioning the Future of FBC: Strategic Planning Update

Dear Friends,

Seventy-six of you filled out the survey that our executive board put together with the help of our consultants - thank you for that! We are in the process of gleaning all that we can from your answers.

There are some clear trends and agreements - we are firmly committed to inclusion, diversity of thought/belief, social justice, and community service/outreach. There's a lot we value about FBC, and we're most excited about each other - about the collection of kind, wise, thoughtful, people that make up this congregation - we're excited about learning from each other and growing together. We appreciate the emphasis on an action-oriented faith that seeks to make a difference in our community and world. We also have suggestions for what we could do better, and for ideas to pursue, questions to consider, so that we can thrive well into the future.

And all of that is just from an initial reading. Our consultants from the Oregon Organizational Development Network - Bruce, Marisol, Laura, and Glen - are currently analyzing the answers from multiple angles to see what else comes to light. We will share more as we learn it.

The Board has decided to continue our partnership with the OODN. Our initial time with them began in the fall and ran through January, but in many ways we feel like that was a getting-to-know-you period, and we're just now starting on the real work. So we have invested another \$200 to retain their services through June.

Now, we'd like to begin to have the Congregational Conversations that will give substance to this work. Each month, we'll tackle one major topic - we hope you can attend one of two monthly sessions. The Monday sessions will be hybrid, so you can come in person or via Zoom; links will be emailed. Here's the plan:

### Seasons of Wonder



The second invitation in Bonnie Smith Whitehouse's *Seasons of Wonder* is Discover Contemplation. There are many ways we know what we know, she reminds us - we know through experience, through our senses, through "the wonders of language, through the intricacies of cognition, through deep wells of emotion, and through the stories, culture, and tradition we inherit." She suggests we can also know through stillness and contemplation, by cultivating "a reservoir of inner calm within ourselves. We can always visit this place of stillness, this awareness of the Holy Spirit moving in and through us." This month, consider:

Heidi Toth and Jack Mandeville, who both serve on the Worship and Community Engagement Team, will be traveling to Grand Rapids, Michigan to meet with the grant providers, to share about FBC's hopes and goals with this project, and to learn from other churches and their projects. We are grateful to have been awarded this funding and hope it makes it possible for anyone who wants to, to be able to participate in these activities by removing the barrier of expense.



### Church Board Notes, January 10th

The Church Board met as scheduled on December 10th in person with two folks joining by computer.

Charlie Walker made a presentation from the Endowment Committee, sharing that our team selects investments that meet Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) standards. This means our investments will be made with companies that share our values, even if that means we make a bit less money over time.

Dee Moore from Together Works joined us to discuss gender-neutral bathrooms. It is important that our building reflects our commitment to be an open and welcoming congregation, and Dee walked us through what that should look like, specifically when it comes to gender-neutral bathrooms. We will have details to share at the semi-annual meeting, so stay tuned for details on this project coming soon.

Virginia shared a devotion on moving beyond dualities (good vs. evil, light vs. dark, etc.) The hope is to create a new paradigm of peace and understanding where we pray for others, not to convert them to our faith, but that they remain strong in their own faiths.

The Board shared their team reports, and Kathleen shared her progress on the Dance Fundraiser. If you are interested in helping to plan this event, please reach out to Kathleen. Steve Howard is looking into the details of holding a car raffle fundraiser. We agreed that proceeds should be split between the bus fund and supporting current Church operations. The group acknowledged that this means it will take longer and require multiple raffles for multiple cars. Don Watson shared the latest version of the 2024 budget. After much deliberation, the Board agreed to pass along the budget as amended to the congregation for approval at the semi-annual meeting.

We are still in search of a special person to fill a vacant position on the Board representing the membership team, so if you are interested, please contact me or Erika for more information.

Finally, our next Board meeting will be held at 6:30pm on Wednesday, February 21st in hybrid format; in person in the FBC second floor conference room AND also on Zoom. ### **Good Vegan Muffins** from Lara O'Brady a low-carbon recipe from the Climate Action Group

#### Ingredients for muffin bottom:

I <sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> cups flour (can be any combination of white, whole wheat or Namaste G.F. flour)
<sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>2</sub> cup white sugar
<sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>2</sub> cup brown sugar
I tablespoon baking power
<sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>2</sub> teaspoon baking soda
<sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>2</sub> teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons cinnamon
<sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> teaspoon ground ginger
I cup pumpkin or butternut squash puree
2 teaspoons vanilla
<sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>2</sub> cup vegan milk (soy or almond work well)
I teaspoon vinegar, either apple cider or white
<sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>2</sub> cup light olive oil, grapeseed oil or other oil with little taste

#### Streusel Topping (optional):

½ cup brown sugar
1/3 cup flour (any type you need)
3 tablespoons vegan butter
¼ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon cinnamon
1/8 teaspoon nutmeg
1/8, cup quick cocking catmool (a)

1/8 cup quick cooking oatmeal (optional)

#### Directions for muffin bottom:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Combine all dry ingredients in bowl and stir and mix well.

Combine milk and vinegar. Let sit for one minute and then add the rest of the wet ingredients.

Add the wet ingredients to the dry ingredients and mix until well combined. Be careful not to OVER mix. 1 or 2 minutes of stirring with a spoon is sufficient.

Add to greased muffin tin or use muffin papers.

### **Optional Topping:**

Use a food processor or pastry blender to combine the Streusel topping. The vegan butter should be well combined and about ½ the size of a pea. Sprinkle the topping over the wet muffin bottom.

Bake mini muffins for 10 - 15 minutes, standard muffins for 16-20 minutes, and large muffins for 25 minutes. A toothpick should come out clean when inserted.

### Getting To Know The Classes & Small Groups at FBC

### The Story of FBC's Little Free Library Ministry

Did you know that...

- More than half the children in the US (approx. 13 million) will not hear a bedtime story tonight.\*
- Two out of three children living in poverty have no books to call their own.\*

# The goals of the Little Free Library (LFL) organization are to provide access to books for all ages, strengthen literacy skills, and engage communities.

What better than to build a LFL and place it in the FBC Courtyard, to celebrate the completion of the FBC Bell Tower and Courtyard renovation! So, Susan Chambers approached Paul Kushner for advice on building a simple, Little Free Library for the Courtyard. When Paul heard that the Courtyard library would honor Charlie Walker for his leadership as chair of the renovation committee, he said, "I have an idea!" There was considerable planning, gathering of supplies, and help from Wayne Beckwith to make a metal roof, and this beautiful, not so little, Little Free Library was completed in October 2020. We can't thank Paul Kushner enough for his creative vision and woodworking skills!



During this time, Susan met with the Matthew 25 Committee, who acknowledged that it wasn't realistic for them to provide consequences to the people damaging the LFL. So, Pastor Erika suggested the idea of placing the LFL inside, especially since so many groups use space in the building. On a weekly basis, FBC provides space for 22 recovery groups and A Family Place Relief Nursery and Diaper Bank/clothes closet. FBC also provides space for American Red Cross Blood Drives, space for the Women's Choir to practice and perform, a monthly concert series and for many other groups.

So, the LFL is back in the business of engaging community and providing access to books in Walker Hall!! The LFL will operate as it did in the Courtyard, with volunteer stewards who will serve monthly shifts to stock the LFL with books.

### **Getting To Know Your First Baptist Church Family**



**MATT & CHERIE YOUNG** were both Northwest-born and raised--Cherie in Walla Walla, WA and Matt in Albany, OR. Cherie had six siblings. She said she loved to fish as a kid but never learned to like the taste of fish. Matt grew up with one younger brother. His memories are of road trips, camping, fishing and waterskiing with his family.

After high school, both of them eventually found themselves in Corvallis, working for the same company. And that's where they met--at a company picnic. Responding to what he says was a needed prod from a friend, Matt asked Cherie out-and it took!

Matt laughingly claims he went to college on the "Disgruntled Workers" program, after deciding he didn't want to spend the rest of his life doing what he was doing at the time. So he got an Associate's Degree at Linn-Benton CC, leading to his landing a job in year 2000 with the City of McMinnville's Waste Water Treatment Plant. He started out in operations and is now supervising the lab as the Environmental Services Supervisor.

The Youngs have two sons, currently ages 22 and 24, whom Cherie home-schooled for much of their school experience--a real dedication. Their younger son, Josh, went to high school at the Sheridan Japanese School, which piqued his interest in Japan and its language. When Josh attended Linfield University, he chose majors in intercultural communication and Japanese. Fulfilling a degree requirement, he spent last year in Japan, giving Cherie and Matt a wonderful opportunity to visit him in Tokyo for 10 days and also to celebrate their 25th wedding anniversary there. A trip highlight for Matt was trying new foods and drink at the Tsukiji Fish Market and for Cherie was the architecture at the Senso-ji Shrine.

In their spare time, both Cherie and Matt like to play board games, read books in a variety of genres, and do a lot of walking and hiking. They are also beginner kayakers, stressing that right now they appreciate calm waters.

Though neither Matt nor Cherie were raised in church-going families, when they had their first child, they both decided that they wanted to get involved with church. This began in Corvallis, and they have been attending somewhere ever since. Since year 2000, they have moved back and forth between Sheridan and McMinnville, attending church in the town in which they lived.

Then, having bought a house in McMinnville, Matt was ready to try something different. He realized that he didn't really fit in the churches they had been attending, that he made a



terrible conservative and awful fundamentalist, asking too many questions--that he really was a liberal. When asked how they found this church, Matt answered that we (FBC) have a reputation in the community which he respected and admired even when they were attending more conservative churches. So a couple of years ago, they gave FBC a try. Both liked what they experienced here and they joined the church just this last December. Matt has participated with the Bereans class and Cherie is ready to try some of FBC's many offerings. Welcome, Matt and Cherie!

### Why do so many people at FBC support MacHabitat?



Having a home is one of the most basic and fundamental needs for every person. We know that there are people in our community who lack a good home. There are so many reasons why people live in sub-standard housing, but the main reasons are a critical lack of affordable homes and a lack of resources. We see a new homeowner bursting with happiness and pride as they move into a well-built home with support from their community. The new life that Partnering Families provides is frequently a game changer. The families health improves when they have good indoor air quality and adequate heat. Their pride increases as they start along the path to long-term equity.

Lara O'Brady and Emily Duerfeldt have both been in homes that are totally inadequate. Emily continues, "I see the need for homes and food. I love supporting people who are building these homes." She is a true Cookie Queen. Lara says, "I love seeing people as they move into a new phase of life and seeing our community come together to support vulnerable families. It breaks my heart open in the best possible way."

First Baptist Church has been a long-time partner with McMinnville Area Habitat for Humanity (MacHabitat) as they work toward its mission of bringing people together to build homes, community, and hope, since 1991. This local affiliate of Habitat for Humanity International was established by a group of community members, including FBC Pastor Bernie Turner, to help ensure that everyone in our area has a safe, decent, affordable, place to live. Since its inception, MacHabitat has built 68 homes, with the current build site being a 34-lot development off Cumulus Avenue in McMinnville, called the Aspire Community Development. This development is a little more than half complete, with hopes of completing all the homes and common areas at this location in the next 4-5 years.

In Yamhill County, 57% of households earn below 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI) and are considered lowincome. During a time when affordable housing opportunities are at a critical low, MacHabitat was able to mark some significant successes in working toward their goals in 2023:

- Securing unprecedented funding from Oregon Housing and Community Services to build more affordable housing units at a time, allowing MacHabitat to start four new homes in September, while finishing two more in the Aspire Community Development in McMinnville in December.
- Opening the ReStore Receiving doors 5 days/week, to prevent more building materials and household items from reaching the landfill. MacHabitat then sells these items at the ReStore, where profits assist in providing homeownership opportunities for low-income partners.
- Choosing four new homeowner partners. With homes in the Aspire Community Development assembling at a faster pace, MacHabitat was able to choose more home buyers for their program.
- Receiving seed money from Oregon Community Foundation to start a Repair Program to help complete construction repairs, build ramps, and provide other accessibility accommodations for homeowners who can't afford to fix unsafe conditions. MacHabitat is hoping to implement this program in Spring 2024.

There are many ways that First Baptist Church has supported MacHabitat through the years, including volunteering - at the construction site, at the ReStore, on the "Cookie Crew" (providing snacks for volunteers), on committees, and on the Board of Directors - as well as donations from the church and its members.

MacHabitat thanks us for our years of support to ensure we provide homeownership opportunities to low-income folks in our community!











### Baptist Peace Fellowship of North America (BPFNA), A 2023 Year in Review.

Since its beginning more than 40 years ago BPFNA has been a Baptist voice for peace and justice. The organization gathers, equips and mobilizes peacemakers and justice seekers across the North American continent and beyond. The leadership team and its members work

hard to dismantle racism, militarism, colonialism and anything else that mars the roads to peace. ~ Doug Donley, President, Board of Director at BPFNA

This past year the annual Peace Camp was held in Costa Rica gathering 90 in-person participants, 2,100 virtual watches, representing 9 countries. Peace Fund grants were available to support and equip grassroots peace projects. One recipients was the Baptist Seminary of Mexico in Mexico City. Its goal was to provide citizen workshops on conflict transformation in marginalized and indigenous Mexican communities.

Another recipient was the Peace Cathedral located in Tbilisi, Republic of Georgia. Yes, our own Holstrom family visited the Peace Cathedral in 2023! The Peace Cathedral is hosting three interfaith conventions on ecological peace, intercultural and inter-national peace, and interpersonal peace involving multi-faith clergy & laity from Georgia, Iran, Iraq, Israel, and Turkey.



BPFNA became a founding signatory of the Apartheid-Free Communities initiative, an ecumenical coalition of faith groups

recognizing the State of Israel's treatment of the Palestinian people as apartheid and stepping away from any and all support to Israeli military occupation and settler colonialism. The goal is a just Peace in the Holy Land. A webinar was held in October introducing this movement to mobilize the membership of BPFNA.

Other opportunities to mobilize the membership were to provide speakers and visiting pastors to several Cuban churches. Lectures and events were also shared with the Association of Welcome and Affirming Baptists. BPFNA was present at The Gun Violence Survivor Sit-in sponsored by the Newtown Action Alliance of Washington DC. It was another event that mobilized people for Peace and Justice.

FBC is a member of BPFNA. Let's strengthen our gathering, supporting, equipping, and mobilizing for Peace with Justice!

Let's send a group to this year's Peace Camp. It will be held in the USA at Mars Hill University in Mars Hill, NC. **Save the dates of July 15-20, 2024**. Please check the BPFNA website <<u>https://www.bpfna.org</u>> to register. Maybe several families and friends could attend this year!


