# Visioning the Future of FBC: Strategic Planning Update





Dear Friends,

We began our March Congregational Conversations by asking participants to name FBC's resources. As notetaker, I filled up two giant sheets of paper - and could have recorded more, but we had to move on to the next question! Here's *just a bit* of what was named:

Dedicated Volunteers · History and Tradition · Flexibility
Reputation in Community · Ecumenical/Interfaith Openness
Close-to-Downtown Location & Parking · Neighbors · Readerboard
Large Sanctuary with Balcony · Financial Generosity · Education
Youth Programs · Strong Community of Elders · Relationships

With all of that in mind, we turned to questions of what it means to steward those resources - how do we meaningfully sustain and nurture all of that? - and then, specifically, what we might do in/with our building. Ideas for the latter ranged from strengthening our current non-profit partnerships and forging new relationships, to sharing space with other faith communities, to renovating spaces so they might be more attractive to new users. Folks asked how our building can help us better serve our community, and how it might limit us. We recorded all that was shared so that it can inform our future planning. # WELCOME INCARNATION



The fourth invitation in Bonnie Smith Whitehouse's Seasons of Wonder is Welcome Incarnation. She describes two incarnations: the first, the beginning of creation, when God "emptied in to the universe" and "the spirit of God was infused through the flora and fauna"; and the second, "when God, who is Love, empties into the Son, who is Jesus." Christians often think only of the second incarnation, Whitehouse notes, but remembering the first can tune us to hear the sacredness of the world, to remember all the ways "God is merging with the visible, physical world." This month, she suggests we can Welcome Incarnation by:

- Imagining how tending to one another is tending to the body of Christ.
- Writing a prayer that illustrates love for our non-human neighbors.
- Pondering what it means to embody not simply attend or belong to something called "church."

A couple of ways the author suggests connecting to the weekly themes of this month:

- Listen *Life Is a Church* by Marcus Hummon; *Lord of the Dance* by Sydney Carter
- \* Read Wild Geese by Mary Oliver; Manifesto: The Mad Farmer Liberation Front by Wendell Berry

## **April Seasons of Wonder Gatherings**

#### **Small Group Meetings**

Small groups will continue to meet monthly throughout 2024. If you're connected to a group but unsure of its next meeting time, contact the church office. If you're not yet connected to a group but would like to be, let Erika know.

Field Trip: Eloheh Farm, Saturday, April 27, leave from FBC 9am We'll immerse ourselves in the wonder of creation at Eloheh Indigenous Center for Earth Justice, where the focus is on developing, implementing, and teaching sustainable and regenerative earth practices. Their nearly ten-acre farm in Yamhill seeks to be a model of regenerative agricultural, animal husbandry, and wild-tending systems that support human needs, while improving the earth and all creation inhabiting the web of life. We'll join the Climate Action Group in learning from and offering service to the farm. Meet in the FBC parking lot at 9am and plan to return about 2pm. Bring a lunch and water bottle.

Makers Meeting: Flowering Cross - Sunday, March 31, 9:30am A long-standing tradition of FBC is mentioned in Seasons of Wonder: the Flowering Cross. Come early on Easter morning, with cut blooms from your garden or a flower shop, and help fill the holes in a wooden cross with fresh blossoms. This activity transforms a symbol of hate, torture, and death into a witness for life, beauty, and joy.

# **April's Creation Care** Challenge:

Plant a bare-root tree!

Celebrate Earth Day on April 22 by planting a bare-root tree (or plant any sort of flora if a bare-root tree is not possible for your living situation). If you can't plant the tree within a day or so of its arrival, put wet newspaper around the roots. If you can, place it in a bucket of water for 12-24 hours. Dig a hole at least one and a half to two times as wide as the tree's root ball, but just one time as deep, so you don't bury the trunk and crown of roots. Place the tree in the hole, backfill the hole, and then stake the tree. Add mulch and water well as the tree gets established.

**Financial Update** - Our 2-month deficit is a combination of higher than normal utilities, two extra payments carried over from December and lower than budgeted income. In January the congregation approved a deficit of \$19,000 for 2024 and that we would cover that, if needed, with memorial funds. We have lowered that amount to \$17,000 and have not drawn any from those funds. The Church Board plans to create a plan at our March 13th meeting.

#### Church Board Notes, March 13th

The Church Board met as scheduled in person. All attendees were present with Virginia joining by computer, and Steve, Mary, Heidi, and Kerry unable to attend.

Dave shared a devotion from the website momsoffaith.com about sailing on stormy seas. The quote for reflection was "A smooth sea never made a skilled sailor." The point is that we need to go through the tough times so we are better prepared for the next challenge. God is with us, even during these difficult times. This makes me think about the difficulties we encounter leading FBC through our current financial challenges while we try to serve the needs of all those who rely on us. The devotion ended with a quote from James 1:12 ESV (revised to reflect our diversity): "Blessed is the person who remains steadfast under trial, for when they have stood the test they will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love Him."

During Team Reports, Nadya shared that she and Mary have been helping Marilyn organize the music library, which will allow for sorting by different criteria, such as difficulty and which instruments are included. Don reported that two heaters were in need of attention in spaces used by A Family Place. One needs to be replaced, and the other was repaired. There are several of these heaters in the building, and as they are all over 23 years old, it is difficult to get parts to repair them. The Building & Grounds team is also looking into options for the glass doors on First Street. Don shared the treasurer's report. We are in the hole, year to date, primarily due to unexpected Building and Grounds expenses. Don also noted that we are still in search of new reps for the Stewardship Committee. If you have any suggestions, please reach out to Don for details. This committee plays a vital role in determining how we can best tell our story of service to our supporters.

The Board discussed next steps for our Congregational Conversations surrounding different aspects of our Strategic Plan process. The February meeting was well-attended, and we hope you can join us of our next session on March 24th. The focus will be on *stewardship of our resources and sharing our space* – all the different groups that call FBC home (Sunday School classes, small groups, A Family Place, Scouts, concerts, and recovery groups).

In other news, Erika reported that Geoff Clayton was successful in applying to Yamhill County for a grant to help cover some of the shelter expenses not covered by the YCAP grant. Erika also shared that Doug Verigin successfully administered a dose of Narcan to someone in the courtyard. A good reminder that we have this life-saving medicine available at the STAR breakfasts, in the office, and at the shelter. We discussed the Auto Raffle idea, and it came up that Juliette's House is doing one, so we may want to see how theirs does before we do our own. Kathleen reported that the FBC Fundraiser Dance will be held at the McMinnville Grange Hall on Saturday, June 8th. We will work to incorporate the June theme of "Come Alive" from our Seasons of Wonder project. Virginia also presented information about the Red Chair Project, which is an awareness campaign for domestic violence. The Board agreed to host a display in Walker Hall later this year, probably during October.

Now it is getting to be the time of year when we start looking for new Board members. Some of our current roster will be moving on, which creates some openings. If you are interested, please reach out to Erika. We would love to have you serve with us! Speaking of new members, we are still in search of a special person to fill a vacant position on the Board representing the membership team, so if you are interested, please contact me or Erika for more information. Finally, our next Board meeting will be held at 6:30pm on Wed., April 10 in hybrid format; in person in the FBC second floor conference room AND also on Zoom. # Monday April 22<sup>nd</sup>, at 7:00 p.m. In the Sanctuary "Common Ground" The Movie

Is a new film about how regenerating the world's soils has the potential to rapidly stabilize Earth's Climate, restore lost ecosystems, and create abundant food supplies.

This film explains why transitioning to regenerative agriculture could be the key in rehabilitating the planet, while simultaneously invigorating a new sense of hope and inspiration for those viewing the film. The film is 87 minutes long and has been made available through Interfaith Power & Light and Roco Films without cost for Faith Climate Action Week. It is the winner of the 2023 Tribecca Film Festival Human/Nature Award and 6 other awards, including a nomination for best documentary of 2023.

We will receive a freewill offering to support the work of Interfaith Power and Light and Eloheh, an indigenous, regenerative farm in Yamhill.

There'll be a brief discussion following the film, as we consider next steps we might take.

The following Faith Statement is adapted from The American Baptist Churches Website:

Climate change is a moral and spiritual issue that is causing unprecedented harm to God's creation and people. Climate change is having, and will continue to have profound effects—from injury and illness to displacement and destruction—on people across the globe. Whether your religious experience is connected to the sanctity of God's creation, peacemaking, alleviating poverty, or overcoming racism, you need not look far to witness climate injustice, such as disparities in childhood asthma and inequitable response to disaster in communities of color. If your passion is driven by a passion to care for the next generation, nothing threatens our children's wellbeing more than an unstable climate.

## **Getting To Know the Classes & Small Groups at FBC**



**KnitWits** (by the numbers) was formed in October of 2012 for the purpose of knitting and crocheting items to give to charity, as well as being a place for fellowship.

Presently,  $\underline{2}$  groups convene (every  $\underline{2}$ nd and  $\underline{4}$ th Thursday morning and on the  $\underline{1}$ st and  $\underline{3}$ rd Tuesday evenings) to produce knitted and crocheted hats, baby sweaters, blankets, prayer squares, scarves, hand warmers, prayer shawls, and lap robes for

adults, kids and babies. Generally  $\underline{9-12}$  people with a combined age of more than  $\underline{920}$  years participate in the  $\underline{2}$  groups. We sometimes talk as much as (or more than) we knit or crochet!

Over <u>342</u> items were donated in <u>2023</u> to <u>11</u> different places, including FBC, STARS, Winter Shelter, Cancer Center, Veterans, Family Place, Parkland Assisted Living, and various individuals. Included in this were <u>160+</u> hats and <u>100</u> hand warmers (fingerless gloves) mostly for the STARS program.

More volunteers are always appreciated to knit or crochet regardless of whether or not you can attend a group meeting. Ministry Leaders are Linda Watson and Gina Foster and we'd love to have you join us!

# **Getting To Know Your First Baptist Church Family**

**Karen and John Olson** are relatively new to our fellowship here at First Baptist Church, but they came to McMinnville four years ago, in 2020.

Karen's father was a pastor, and she spent her early years in upstate New York in a rural area of that state. She had three younger siblings. Her Junior High and High School years were spent in Flint, Michigan, until her Senior year, when the family moved to Gresham, Oregon, where she graduated from High School. She moved to Chicago, Illinois to attend Moody Bible Institute, which is where she met her future husband, John Olson.



John's father was also a pastor, so he and Karen were both "Preacher's Kids". John was born and raised in Burlington, Iowa. He was the youngest of three children and the only son. When he was 12 years old, the family moved to Texas, where he completed Junior High and High School. After that, it was on to Moody Bible Institute in Chicago.

The first time John visited Karen's family in Oregon, he fell in love with the beauty of the Pacific Northwest. It was such a change from the corn fields of lowa, where he spent his early years. After he and Karen were married, they knew they wanted to move to Oregon and make a life for themselves there.

When an opportunity to pastor a church in Manzanita, Oregon presented itself, they accepted the offer. They lived in Manzanita for 12 years and all four of their children were born during that time.

They moved to McMinnville to serve as co-associate pastors for youth at McMinnville Covenant Church. In 2023, they changed careers, with Karen working as Communications Director for the Oregon Coast Visitors Association and John as Assistant Director of Career Development at Linfield University. In April, John will take on a new opportunity as CEO of the McMinnville Area Chamber of Commerce.

John and Karen love their new church home at First Baptist. They say it's a good fit for them in all the ways that matter to them. They are both active in the Music Ministry, singing in the Choir. Their four children are involved in children's ministry and the McMinnville Youth Collective.

They and their children love to explore the outdoors, through hiking and camping together. They also love museums and theatre. In fact, the whole family has acted in two plays together at Gallery Theatre, the latest being *Anne of Green Gables*.

We are grateful to have this talented and loving family as part of our fellowship at FBC. They all add so much to the life of our church and we are glad they found us.



#### Safe Families for Children

Churches all over the country are celebrating Safe Families Sunday on April 7. Come to FBC that morning to learn more about this movement of radical hospitality.

Hi! I'm Mike Barry. A little bit about me: I'm the Program Manager for the Safe Families movement. I've been in this role since October of 2023. Prior to this role I worked as a DHS Case Worker. I worked in that role with many different agencies in many different parts of the country over the years. Total time in that role was 25 years.

My working journey with DHS has never dictated where my heart has been for the families I've served. I recognize that there are reasons that children come into foster care. However, moving into foster care in many instances just causes more trauma and drama in a family. My goal has been to help children stay with their own family as long as the situation and environment is safe for the child or children to remain in their own home. So many times throughout my career, I saw cases where, if the family was given the right resources and tools to keep their children and home safe, many of those children didn't have to come into foster care. We know from the research that has been done that keeping children with their own families only increases the chances of children doing better in school, staying stable in a career, and just living life to the fullest.



The mission of Safe Families is keep children safe and families together.

We do that by recruiting, training, and supporting volunteers in churches to host, mentor, serve as family coach, family friend, or resource friend to families in crisis, before the crisis gets out of hand and DHS has to step in and remove the children.

We are always actively recruiting volunteers, because the need is great. Also because we work in a non-profit ministry, we have to rely on grants and donations to keep the movement going. Therefore, another way people can get involved is to financially donate toward the movement.

The needs are great and increasing daily. I can't think of a better way to give back to people than to actively do what the Bible commands us as Christians to do. 1 Peter 4: 8-9 says that we are all to offer hospitality to one another without grumbling and share with the Lord's people who are in need.



I recognize that there are many ministries that specialize in many aspects of life and some that specialize in individual needs. The ministry of Safe Families has life-long implications for some families because when there can be a mentor or family friend to another person that is in crisis that has never had anyone like that in their life, it can make all the difference in the world for them and impact them through that relationship that they will have with that volunteer for many years and in some cases a lifetime.

We would love for your church to get more involved with Safe Families as a volunteer at any level or donate financially so that the movement can continue making positive impacts for the people we serve in Yamhill County.

It takes a village to raise children and support families and for many families in Yamhill County, A Family Place is that village. A Family Place programs are a few of the many programs of Lutheran Community Services supporting children and families. The mission of A Family Place is to nurture children and empower families to strengthen our local community. We believe all families want what is best for their children and we partner with families facing multiple stressors in our community to provide the tools, resources, and support needed to be the best parents they can be.

A Family Place is here for all families and we have something for everyone, from supporting them with very basic needs like diapers and clothing at the Diaper Bank to universal family support through parenting education groups. We meet families where they are without judgment.

For families with children 5 and younger who need a little more support in their journey, Healthy Families and the **Relief Nursery** offer one on one family support services through home visiting. An added bonus of the Relief Nursery are the therapeutic classrooms which offer specialized early childhood classroom experiences to support children in developing their social-emotional skills and gives parents the needed respite.



We are proud to share with you our accomplishments from 2023:

- Across our 3 diaper bank locations (Newberg, McMinnville, and Willamina) we welcomed 1,828 visitors, 252 of them indicated it was their first-time accessing the diaper bank.
- On average we distributed 10,000 diapers a month via the diaper banks, during home visits, and in the classrooms.
- 163 parents and caregivers completed one of our parenting education group series.
- Our Healthy Families home visiting program served 52 families and completed 628 home visits with them.
- The Relief Nursery program served 83 families and supported parents in reducing their stressors by 27%.
