Field Trip: Durant at Red Ridge Farms, July 14, after worship



Church Board Notes, June 12th

The Church Board met as scheduled on June 12th in person. We had a visit from Charlie Walker, on behalf of the Endowment Committee. Now that the principal value has increased, we are generating enough interest income to consider using some of that money on essential building needs. Before that can happen, we need to settle on a procedure for Building & Grounds to request to use funds, and an approval process for the Board to authorize this spending. The Board voted to accept the proposal as submitted by the Endowment Committee.

Cynthia shared a devotion from her mom's meditation book "The Love Book". One section stated that love is the magician that changes things to joy, and removes the edge of terror from new things. The reading also said in times of doubt, reach out.

Kathleen offered to make binders for each member of the Board. The binders would have key information about each position, an organizational chart, Church Bylaws, and other important documents. The binders would then be passed off to the next person to hold that seat on the Board.

The Board also discussed plans for the Semi-Annual Meeting, to be held on June 30th directly after the service. We plan to include a Ministry Fair so folks can learn more about these opportunities. The Semi-Annual meeting will also include a recommended change to the Bylaws to address Sean's sabbatical request and some suggestions from the Membership Ministry Team, and an update on the gender-neutral

bathrooms discussion. We will also take a moment to recognize the outgoing Board members (including me!). We will also nominate and elect new Board members for several positions.

After hearing the Team Reports and Financial update, Kathleen shared that the Dance fundraiser was a big success, with about \$4,000 raised for Amos and the Fellowship Fund. Speaking of the Fellowship Fund, we will bring back a lapsed tradition of asking folks to contribute to the fellowship fund once a month during the offering time. The fund is a key way that FBC can provide assistance to our neighbors in need.

The Board also authorized Erika to sign a contract with a security company to provide nightly supervision of our campus. We will use YCAP funds for this work, with County grant money covering the shelter expenses.

We have not heard differently from YCAP, so we are still planning on a September 1st transition to the community shelter moving over to the YCAP location on South Adams Street. We are planning a recognition brunch for our volunteers on September 29th.

Finally, our next Board meeting will be held at 6:30pm on Wednesday, July 10th. The meeting will be in hybrid format; in person in the FBC second floor conference room AND also on Zoom. Guests are always welcome at Church Board meetings, so please email Erika if you would like to be added to the agenda, or if you would like a meeting invite to attend via Zoom.








Membership Highlight

Getting to Know Your First Baptist Church Family



Roger Krug was born in Salem, Oregon but moved with his family when still a young boy to Orange County in Southern California. His family included a younger sister and an older brother and sister. Working at Safeway during high school, he became interested in food science and after high school he attended Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, choosing food science as his major.

After college because of relatives in this area, Roger moved back to Oregon. He took a job with the Oregon Department of Agriculture Food Safety Division. He was responsible for inspecting retail markets and any kind of food processing, including pasteurization equipment, mainly in Yamhill and Polk counties, but all over the state. He kept this position for 31 years.

After Roger moved to Oregon, Mary Jane also moved up from Southern California so that they could marry. Mary Jane taught elementary school in Dundee. Sadly Mary Jane passed away nine years ago after a lengthy battle with cancer. Their two children are now adults, married and living in Hillsboro and Portland. But, as yet, Roger says he has no grandchildren.

Roger attended the Mennonite church while a young boy in Oregon. In California, the family was involved with the Church of the Brethren. In fact, Roger knew FBC member Paul Studebaker because they attended the same Brethren church in California.

After moving to Mac, Roger and Mary Jane attended the Presbyterian Church. Following a change of leadership there, Roger was looking for something different and first got involved with the Faith and Java Sunday class at FBC. He started attending this church when Kent Harrop was pastor and became a member in 2019. Roger has participated in Erika's weekly Bible Study.

Roger loves to dance. Along with several other FBC faithfuls, including your correspondent, he could be found at the Horse Radish Restaurant in Carlton when the McCanns were playing there. His favorite type of dancing is Western Swing, which he said he learned at Cal Poly, it being somewhat of an agricultural school!

Before the pandemic, after losing Mary Jane, Roger did a fair amount of traveling, visiting relatives, just to get out of the house and relieve the loneliness. Now he is spending his time trying to sort through all the accumulation from having lived in the same house for forty years, working on downsizing and perhaps moving to a retirement community.

If you don't already know him, take the time to reach out to Roger when you see him. You will be rewarded by meeting an interesting fellow.

Mission Moment - Fellowship Fund



Life happens, hitting people hard, especially as they get further behind in monthly expenses; it can be overwhelming. It only takes one thing to start a downward spiral (medical bills, a car expense, the loss of a job, just life).

FBC's Fellowship Fund provides much needed help in time of crisis with immediate assistance for: (to name a few)

- Rental assistance to avoid eviction/ first & last deposit to be able to finally get into a new place.
- Utilities (gas, electric, water, sewer)
- Medication, prescriptions
- Providing one or a few night stays in a hotel to refresh.
- Phone payments and/or securing free phones (being connected is important)
- Car/RV repair (Living in one's car requires heat & comfort)
- Help in securing an Oregon ID or DL or SS card (all are required to get a job, apply for SNAP, apply for local/state/federal, or other services)

FBC's Office Manager Donna administers the available Fellowship Funds, with guidance from the Pastor. To meet a larger need, First Baptist Church has created a partnership with First Presbyterian Church, the Cooperative Ministries, and the Give-a-Little Foundation (which includes referrals from Oregon & Federal agencies such as the Service Integration Team (SIT), part of Yamhill County Community Care). So, when one of us can't - all of us can!

Beyond these needs, FBC also has a food pantry, clothing closet, and showers available. People are given access to these during STARS breakfast Mondays & Fridays and during church office hours.

Two FBC Success Stories . . .

"We all fall on hard times in life, it's nice to know someone is out there who can put us back on our feet." -- a Fellowship Fund Recipient

FBC has helped this couple for the past 10 years - living on the street, overcoming addiction - securing a car to sleep in - eventually working when jobs were available - but managing income was difficult. FBC helped provide food, warm clothing, blankets, car repairs, storage unit expenses, government IDs and Insurance expenses. They were finally able to take a YCAP Housing workshop, allowing them to apply for Federal Housing assistance. Two years later - they have an apartment and making ends meet. They're now on a well-earned and deserved path towards independence - FBC is proud to see them succeed.

Another recent case, helping a elderly woman whose only income is Social Security and a small alimony check (\$1,400/month - are you able to survive on that?). Our partnering group along with NorthWest Senior Disability Services has been able to pay and reconnect Recology service, and pay her water/sewer and PGE payments. HUD stepped in to reorganize her mortgage (non-payment for a year). And by continued counseling by a NWSDS case manager, she'll learn to live within her means, knowing people are there for her.

Above are just two of many success stories.

Requests for assistance like these come in every day, There is so much need that, even with support from our partners, we are unable to help everyone. When we do assist, FBC alone expends between \$600-800/ month on average. As you can see, this is not sustainable. We need ongoing funding to continue this necessary work!

It had already been a full week in the small Nicaraguan village of El Calderon, but our hosts decided we couldn't leave without paying a visit to a





special plot of land. The nine of us who made up FBC's delegation, together with our guides and hosts, journeyed to the open space that sits just off the road, next to a family home, and overlooking the hilly countryside. When we arrived, more friends from the village came to join us, welcoming us with song, presenting us with paper banners on which they'd hand-drawn their thanks for our visit, inviting us to pray with them for their village and the community-empowered health care work facilitated by AMOS Health & Hope there.

It was important to them that this ceremony be held on that particular plot of land, because that's a space they have dreams for. Years ago, a family in El Calderon donated that land, and designated it for a purpose: to be the future home of Calderon's own *casa base*.

A casa base is a health clinic. Folks in Calderon hope for a stand-alone clinic from which Silvina, their health promoter, and other trained health care workers might provide treatment, offer classes and trainings, and store needed supplies and equipment. As of now, all of that happens from Silvina's home, which is complicated for her, her family, and her patients.

Since that visit this winter, FBC folks have continued in conversation with AMOS staff about the possibilities of a casa base in El Calderon. The community has already taken a very significant first step by donating the land. AMOS staff has created a plan to move forward, including meeting with the health committee of El Calderon and then taking following steps:

- Engaging an architect to create a plan, with the hopes of including basic exam rooms, a waiting area, and a space for teaching and modeling early childhood development.
- Engaging a contractor to use the architect's plan to create a building plan and budget.
- Researching government regulations, required permitting, inspections, and the like.
- Planning for electricity for lights and fans, and checking into possibilities for solar energy. They know that these steps are just a beginning, and that more practical matters will arise the further they pursue this project. AMOS is hopeful that this work on the *casa base* for El Calderon might serve as a model for other Nicaraguan communities as well.

The AMOS staff suggested that FBC might be part of inaugurating the casa base in January 2026! Be thinking ahead now if you might like to be part of that delegation.

In other good news, FBC was able to facilitate a gift of \$10,000 to AMOS from the Service Family Foundation, a foundation with ties to an FBC family. And we sent a check for more than \$2,000 from our Alive at Five fundraiser! We give thanks for this long-time partnership, and for all that we learn from, and are able to do together with, AMOS.
