again there next year!







September GATHER COURAGE



The ninth invitation in Bonnie Smith Whitehouse's *Seasons of Wonder* is Gather Courage. There is something about this season - the changing temperatures, the back-to-school energy, that makes it feel like "it's time to rise up and get [our] house in order." There's a lot we can do internally to prepare for those external challenges that ask us to gather our courage, to summon our strength: We can clean our closets, considering what we really need. We can keep learning, even if we're not donning backpacks and headed into classrooms. We can put ourselves in positions to hear each other's stories. We can practices postures - kneeling, sun salutations - that help us embody readiness and courage. We can cultivate five traits, "store them up like the summer tomatoes we've canned, [so] they're at the ready when we encounter the inevitable": curiosity, persistence, flexibility, optimism, and risk-taking. The more of those traits we've been able to summon and strengthen in ourselves, the more we are "ready to step forward, whole-heartedly and with courage."

Church Board Notes, August 14th

In alignment with Seasons of Wonder's suggestion to practice "The Holy Pause" during August, the Church Board met informally on August 14. Don & Linda Watson hosted us in their home for a brief meeting followed by a light pot luck supper. It was nice to 'pause' from doing the business of FBC and enjoy one another's company.

During the meeting, Nadya King and Don Watson reported that they attended the Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon's presentation on "Faith and Politics in a Divide World," Aug. 8.

Buildings & Grounds shared that the State of Oregon is replacing the curb at Washington & Baker Street, moving FBC's property line a bit. They will compensate FBC \$3,500 for the project. Steve Howard will get bids and report.

Following up from our nearly year-long work with Strategic Planning, the Facilities Team reported that Encompass Yamhill Valley is now renting space in the FBC building. The building has a lot of empty space. We are all encouraged to engage small non-profits in need of office space. You can direct them to Don Watson.

The Marketing Team met and came up with numerous ideas for promoting FBC to the wider community. For starters, we've reconstituted the "rack card" at the Welcome kiosk in Walker Hall. Newcomers should be directed there to peruse the various brochures. The team also requested a greater presence of Board members at Sunday service. Name tags will identify us by name. When the kiosk is fully up and running the Board will rotate hosting the kiosk before and after service.

Signs will soon be ordered directing people who don't feel comfortable in either of the main floor restrooms to a more private restroom on the 2nd floor. Together Works reported to Rev. Erika their disappointment, yet they understand our dilemma. Someday the main floor restrooms will be completely remodeled and up-to-date with signage.

Stewardship Leadership is still in flux. There isn't a team, nor is there a designated leader. Stewardship is a vital part of FBC's wealth, health, and overall wellbeing. Please look into your heart and soul and ask: How can I help?

Erika and Matthew 25 members met with the spokesperson for Thursday's Farmers Market. There have been numerous complaints about the smell of urine in the parking lot. Now that the temporary encampments for our houseless friends have been moved away from 1st Street, the Matthew 25 team will look for ways to resolve this issue.

Nadya King & Mary Dressel offered to help organize Children's Chapel when Sean Williams is on sabbatical, January through March, 2025. They will be searching for volunteers for story time with the kiddos, plus Children's Chapel.

Tim Duerfeldt inquired about a training for hands-on CPR and Defibrillator devices around the building. We had this training last November with a (free) facilitator from Portland Police Bureau. I will investigate having another training in November, with a suggestion we consider this a yearly event.

Even though we are in the Dog Days of Summer and Seasons of Wonder invites us to Pause/Laze, know that your Church Board, staff, team leaders and volunteers are always working to make sure FBC lives up to its mission - "the reason we exist as a faith community, the aim that calls us together and sends us out - is to learn, love, serve, and seek justice and joy for all."

PLASTICS RECYCLE PROJECT Saturday, October 5th at FBC 10 am - 1 pm

Thank you for your efforts to reduce the use of plastics and to recycle the

Cost is \$4.00 per bag. To avoid this fee, Drop off directly at the Recology Transfer Station: 2000 NE Orchard Ave (8:30a-5:30p)

Here are some important changes for the October 5th event:

- Recology is now accepting plastic screw-on caps, utensils, straws and bread clips. (BUT not accepted curbside)
 Save the expense you would incur, by taking them directly to Recology's transfer station on Orchard Ave.
- 2) We can now again accept #6 plastics because Denton Plastics in Portland is now processing these items.

 So save them and bring them on October 5th.
- 3) Green Century Recycling will set up near the church and will accept all e-waste, from printers and batteries to large appliances at no charge. Refer to Green Century Recycling for full information. They will also accept styrofoam blocks, packaging peanuts, and styrofoam containers bagged separately at \$10 per 45 gallon bag. This will be a drive-thru drop-off, similar to hazardous waste collections.

Sean P. Williams - Sabbatical Update

It's hard to believe that I started working at First Baptist over 8 years ago! I continue to love what we do, and who we are, as a church. AND I'm so thankful to FBC for granting me a sabbatical in 2025, in recognition of my years of service here and in local church ministry for over 20 years now. I hope this time away will not only provide important space for rest and renewal, but also equip me, upon my return, to continue helping our church do what we do, and be who we are, in our community & world for years to come. Specifically, I will be gone from January 6 through April 6, 2025, and will spend the "work" time of my sabbatical focusing on the collective model of youth ministry that we have been a part of, through the McMinnville Youth Collective (MYC), for the last 5+ years. I know that this is a really good model of ministry that can work, in a time when youth programs and churches need to be adapting in order to thrive - and maybe just survive - for years to come. The benefits of collaborative ministry are practical, as you combine/share youth, finances, resources, and volunteers. But, on a deeper level, it also feels like a healthy, authentic, inclusive, communal way to try to teach/show young people how to do/be church. We are doing this really well, and we've learned a lot to get here over the years. But I've discovered that churches in general are experiencing immense and numerous challenges as they consider/implement/run this type of ministry. And, I believe we can help! So my plan during these three months in 2025 is to develop concrete resources and practices/methods to help other churches organize, launch, and maintain youth collectives in their communities in healthy and sustainable ways. I don't know what the end "product" (for lack of a better word) is yet, but I've already begun having conversations with wise and experienced friends and ministry colleagues to help me simply start imagining what might be possible. I'm a grateful to this church for this opportunity, and the impact it will have on me, FBC, the MYC, our McMinnville community, and other churches!

Getting To Know the Classes & Small Groups at FBC

Sunday morning Adult CHAPEL Class by Virginia Holmstrom

We hope you'll stop by Chapel Class at 8:45 AM on a Sunday morning. Join the circle of chairs, and experience the "radiant spirit" yourself!

Chapel Class is one of the adult classes offered prior to the 10:00 AM church worship service on Sunday mornings during the school year. Chapel Class has been around for years and years, always stepping to the front edge of relevance with contemporary books the classmates read and discuss together. The class rotates between a book specifically about the Bible and a book addressing faith and/or a current societal issue.

In this article, class member Lara O'Brady talks about her experiences in Chapel Class. She remembers being personally invited to the class by Gary Langenwalter. "I like Gary, and thought it might be fun. Why do I keep coming? I learn a lot from the books I've read with the class, many of which I wouldn't have read otherwise. We have great discussion which helps me refine my beliefs and understanding. When someone says, 'I think x, y, z,' I might think, 'Hmmm. I believe x and y, but not z. Why? Why is x and y important to me and z isn't?"

"Our readings and discussions have deepened my understanding of the Bible, our relationship to the Bible, Jesus, and what it means to be a deeply caring, thoughtful Christian. I'm drawn to Chapel Class because of the people there," explains Lara. "These people are some of the most intelligent folks I have ever met. I feel privileged to hear what they think about things. They are respectful when someone has a different opinion. They articulate their opinion and understand that others see things differently. Over time, we have read so many books, and generally I give them away afterwards. I love learning in this supportive environment. Some of our books have been hard. With support, I have been able to understand them much more than I ever would have understood them reading them on my own. Where else can you get so many theologically trained people within one small room?!"

During the past year the class selected, read, and discussed "Who Wrote the Bible?, by Richard Elliot Freedman; "Holy Disruption: Discovering Advent in the Gospel of Mark," by Tracy S. Daub; and "How to Know a Person: the art of seeing others deeply and being deeply seen, by David Brooks. Lara appreciated reading the David Brooks book. She explains, "We know a person by listening to that person. By hearing about people's lives and then praying with and for people, we learn about them. Our discussions help us know all of our class members more deeply. What a gift it is for me to have deep, meaningful conversations with people who really care and have thought about how to deeply care for each other."

Support for one another during times of hardship is a key component of Chapel Class. Each class begins with an invitation to comment about challenges and celebrations and to request prayers for one's self or family or friends. Often, those prayer requests lead to follow-up support during the following days and weeks.

On any given Sunday between September and June, eight to fourteen people gather at 8:45 AM in a large circle of chairs in the Chapel room down the hallway from Walker Hall, across from the church nursery room. If one or more can't make it to the church that day, they may join the conversation on Zoom. **Newcomers are always** warmly welcomed and are drawn into the conversation. Chapel Class has no single teacher, per se, because



each participant comes with a wealth of life experiences, knowledge, and wisdom that deepens the conversation during the class hour. Any class member may volunteer to lead the discussion of an upcoming chapter in the current book being read, typically circulating a few discussion questions and insights from the chapter in advance.

"I have role models in Chapel Class," notes Lara. "That's a gift. I see radiant spirit flowing forth from Chapel Class members. Of course I love it. I get to be showered with this spirit every time I come to class." Join Us! All are Welcome!

Getting to Know Your First Baptist Church Family

Marilyn Dresser Marilyn Dresser grew up in Pullman, Washington where her father, Miles, was a Physics professor at Washington State University and her mother, Muriel, worked at the WSU library and was also the choir director at the American Baptist Church there. Marilyn has an older brother, John, and a younger sister, Laura. Their next door neighbor in Pullman was the organist and was also the Junior Choir Director at the same church her family attended. Marilyn started taking piano lessons from her at an early age and sang in the Junior Choir. She fondly remembers the Church family and the music community as her extended family as she was growing up.

Both of Marilyn's parents graduated from Linfield, so she wasn't sure it should be her top choice for college. She looked at several schools in Washington, and to her surprise, the Linfield faculty, especially Doug Cruikshank and Larry Marsh, were the most welcoming on her visit and led to her decision to attend Linfield. She was accepted and had a double major in Elementary Education and Music because she couldn't choose between the two disciplines. Marion Van Dyk was one of her Music professors. She fondly remembers participating in a Pre-Orientation trip where she met several friends she is still in touch with today, along with President Charlie Walker. During college she attended several McMinnville churches, including FBC.



During finals week of her Senior year at Linfield, she interviewed for an Elementary Music Position in the McMinnville School District and was hired the week after graduation. That's when she started attending First Baptist Church regularly, mainly because of her relationship with Marion Van Dyke and the tradition of great music she enjoyed at FBC. She married her now ex-husband, Steve Cooper, in 1991 and they had two children, Kurtis and Craig who were raised at FBC, attending Sunday School and eventually participating in the youth programs. Marilyn remembers the many contacts and friends during the kids' younger years, particularly Mary Martin. Mary was her children's Sunday School teacher, but followed them and supported them and sent messages to each throughout the years. To this day, Kurtis and Craig bring up in conversation what an impact Mary had on their lives. Marilyn says that Mary Martin made a big impact on our church, including her family and was a great reminder of the deep connections that can be made through service in a church community.

During Marilyn's 38 years with McMinnville School District, she worked mostly as a K-5 Music Teacher, with only one year teaching 4th grade when the District's music program was suspended. It was then that she was thankful that she had the double major in Elementary Education to be able to teach in a classroom! She also spent a year teaching 3rd grade and Music. Marilyn retired from McMinnville School District this spring and will begin her 39th year of teaching in Woodburn School District starting the last week of August 2024.

Marilyn has stayed connected with FBC for all these years because she loves the core of how inclusive we are and the fact that we live out a Matthew 25 ministry, even with its challenges. Marilyn accepted the positions of Choir and Hand Bell Director in 2022 because she is passionate about leading our music programs and continuing the rich tradition of excellence in music developed by past directors, including Marion Van Dyk. She believes music is a very important part of the church service and her goal is to provide a quality of music that reaches folks personally and enhances their worship experience. In her position of director, Marilyn does focus on the programmatic aspects of music, but acknowledges that ministering and outreach to the individuals involved in the music program is just as essential.

Tending the Tenders

"The Great Spirit walks with us through times of trouble, giving us courage and well-being so that we can give to others the same comfort God has given to us. When our suffering overflows because we represent the Chosen One, the Great Spirit gives us overflowing strength and well-being. Our sufferings and the comfort we receive help us to bring you comfort when you suffer in the same way we have. This gives us great hope, for we know that when you share in our troubles, you will also share in our comfort."

-2 Corinthians 1:4-7, First Nations Version

This summer, I was invited to accompany key leadership of AMOS Health and Hope in Managua, Nicaragua. AMOS has been providing community-based primary health care for the community, and by the community, in the most vulnerable communities throughout Nicaragua. Due to many factors, including persistent uncertainty and increased immigration away from Nicaragua, the staff configuration at AMOS has shifted tremendously. I have been a friend and fan of the AMOS family for over 20 years now. I have visited and trained numerous community health promoters and staff in arts-based healing processes for emotional and physical regulation, relational connection and spiritual health and well-being. Most of the current staff are new and haven't received the restorative arts training that I offered in years past. Dr. Woo, the executive director and Christine Lafferty, my IM colleague working at AMOS, invited me to come back to support, encourage and train their current team leaders. In other words, to tend the tenders. To care for those who care for others. Those who attend to what is hurting in others often don't give themselves permission or time to tend to what is hurting in themselves. They need time to tend to what is tender within. Organizations like AMOS, busy meeting the needs of multiple vulnerable communities, can't always carve out time to be present to their own needs. Due to heavy workloads, limited resources, and time constraints, what would normally take an entire week, would be condensed into two days.

These two days were a break from their normal work routine, meant to ease the stress of constant change and uncertainty. This pause was a time to be still, a time to pay attention. To stop, to ask questions, to be present to the present, to quiet the noise long enough to hear the voice of God. A time to tend to, mend, repair and restore their bodies, minds, spirits. Integral health and hope require bodies, minds, spirits and relationships all working together for life. In this short period, we nurtured life in and through our bodies, incarnating as Jesus did, the Good News of eternal life. The arts have healing qualities that are well-suited to restore a sense of normalcy in the lives of staff who have themselves been through or are still going through traumatic experiences and also to empower them with resources and skills to deal with daily stressors. Through play, movement, rhythm, imagination, breath, and meaning-making we created safety, community, and

connections. We paused long enough to ask what keeps us from being present to ourselves, each other, and God.

After the intensive two day leadership training, we planned an all AMOS staff retreat for the following day designed to nurture team building, support, encouragement, and spiritual renewal. In teams of two, each of the 18 team leaders cofacilitated imaginative experiences that they had appreciated from our two previous days together. My role was to care for the group process and support the AMOS team leaders while they facilitated the activities. They led creative body-based exercises that encouraged reflection, connection and growth. It was fascinating to watch them nurture group safety, cohesion and spiritual reflection. As they led their co-workers in pencil dancing, parachute play, imaginative landscapes, animal sounds and other "outside of the box" group play; serious issues, ranging from fatigue, family and co-worker conflict, grief and loss were addressed in safe and supportive ways. By interrupting their normal patterns, they could see in a different way. By pausing to pay attention, they began to hear their own and each other's stories. By tending to what was tender within, they could better attend to what is happening around them from a more compassionate place.

I was honored to accompany my friends and I owe that privilege to you. Thank you for making it possible to share in the sufferings and give to others the comfort and well-being I have received from God so that they too may share that comfort with others. YOU make a difference!
