It's official! FBC Mac is welcomed into the Evergreen Association

Our process of joining with the Evergreen Association of American Baptist Churches is complete! After months of discerning where our congregation might best find a home within our denomination - through congregational conversations, board deliberations, and guest presentations from each region - we decided to move forward with affiliation with Evergreen.

That's old news. The new part is, early in March, representation from the FBC Board - Cynthia Parker, Nadya King, Don Watson, and Erika Marksbury - met with a representative from Evergreen's Euro Caucus to share a little more of our church's journey. At their leadership meeting soon after, the Black, Asian, and Hispanic Caucus leadership, along with Evergreen staff, affirmed the Euro Caucus' recommendation that we be welcomed in - and at their March 21 quarterly meeting (on zoom), that welcome was made official! Kathleen Verigin, Judee Kunze, Vicki Cartwright, Cynthia Parker, and Sean Williams were present to receive that welcome.

Thanks to all of you who have participated over the past months in this process. This is a new beginning we have arrived at together, and we look forward to the growth and nurture it promises to bring.

Deepen skills and practice peacemaking with NVC group work this spring

The Social Justice Team is excited to invite the FBC congregation and the wider community to a further exploration of Non-Violent Communication with teacher/facilitator Tad Beckwith.

Building on last fall's introductory workshop and initial practice group, this new offering would consist of two parts: a topical teaching (NVC with family; working with anger; self-empathy, etc.), followed by small group practice with real-life situations. Attendees could come for one or both parts.

Dates and times are still being determined, but we're hoping to begin in late April and wrap up before summer. Cost would be \$70-100, a sliding scale, for the six weeks, or \$15 for a drop-in.

Non-Violent Communication is a practical tool that can help us articulate our own needs and understand and empathize with one another better. It's useful in personal, communal, and political settings. Stay tuned for details and plan to participate!

Soon you'll notice the outcome of FBC's annual spring cleaning gathering on March 28th. Thanks to all who participate! Spring cleaning has ancient origins; some related to Passover and Easter. Think of it as cleansing for what is to come.

Jim Kilinsky shared his concerns about Social Justice needs with specific requests. The Board decided to take time to consider what Jim presented and make a decision at the April 8th meeting.

Also discussed at the March meeting was the request for more men to join the usher/greeter team, led by Mary Baker. Some of us chuckle over the reality that most of our ushers are women, over a certain age and under a certain height. Guys—speak up and step up!

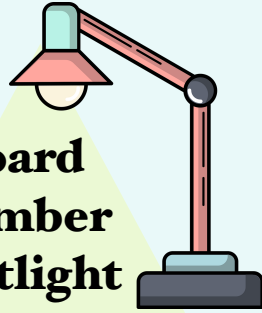

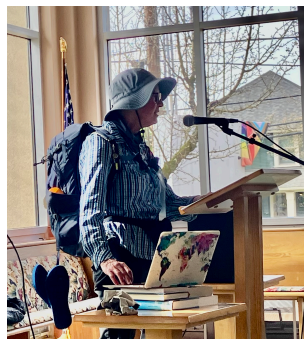

Think about this: This October FBC plans to send its tenth in-person delegation to El Calderon, Nicaragua. TENTH!!! Wow!

For several years, AMOS, FBC, and El Calderón have dreamed of building a new "Casa Base," as the health clinic is known, in El Calderón. Using their gifts of resilience, tact, persistence, and faith to navigate finances, contractors, evolving government officials and regulations, AMOS reports that 2026 is the year that construction begins. And in October FBC delegates can share in celebration of a new health clinic in El Calderón.

FBC's relationship with AMOS manifests in many ways. Some of us connect on Facebook with our Nicaraguan friends; some of us virtually meet with AMOS; some of us do work projects to earn funds for AMOS; some of us regularly donate money. And one of us (FBC folk), David Hallett, is an AMOS Board Member. David returned from the semi-annual board meeting on March 15. What follows is an update from David.

Greetings! As many of you know, I have the great privilege to serve on the Board of Directors for AMOS Health & Hope. I have just returned from the annual spring term board meeting, held in Managua every March. Due to recent governmental changes, the AMOS team is moving from a model of empowering communities one by one, to strengthening the system that serves them all. Executive Director, Dr. Gabriella Woo (who has visited FBC McMinnville in the past!) is quick to point out that "Our mission remains the same: reducing health inequities by empowering local leadership to prevent disease and save lives. What has changed is the scale at which we do it."

This new model strengthens the capacities of health personnel and community network members to promote community actions that contribute to reducing maternal and child mortality from preventable causes. As a result, AMOS is now serving in two new municipalities (Waslala and Rancho Grande) totaling 475 new communities. This represents a 66% increase in the reach of the work of AMOS! In 2025, AMOS helped 260 people gain access to clean drinking water for the first time. They provided over 17,000 unique health-care services to 8,500 people in two urban clinics. **In total, AMOS provided healthcare services directly to 73,000 patients last year alone! Your continued prayers and generous financial support continue to help make all this possible.**

Traveling to Nicaragua may seem like an overwhelming concept. Having led numerous teams of students from Chemeketa Community College over the years, I would like to share something with you from my heart - **You Can Do This Too!**

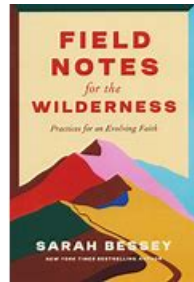
