## Grief & Transition Gatherings

*Coming in July, a space for honest conversation, reflection, and shared humanity*

Many people carry grief quietly — grief connected to loss, aging, caregiving, loneliness, health struggles, uncertainty, or life changing in ways that are difficult to name. Yet there are very few places where people can speak honestly about these experiences in the company of others.

Beginning this summer, First Baptist Church will be offering Grief & Transition Gatherings — small, facilitated gatherings where people are invited into thoughtful conversation around grief, change, uncertainty, resilience, meaning, and hope.

This is not therapy, a class, or a traditional support group. It is simply a respectful and supportive space where people can reflect honestly, listen deeply, and discover they are not alone in what they are carrying. Each gathering includes a small circle of participants, a simple opening reflection, and space for honest sharing and attentive listening.

## From your Church Board ~

FBC, in recent years, has focused on the art of storytelling. Erika's sermons often include stories that help bring to life that week's Bible passage. We have hosted a few story session evenings, giving each person 5 minutes to share a story. There's often a theme—cold winter, blooming in the spring. With summer coming, someone suggested a focus on ice cream, so our July 31 story night theme will be: Treat Yourself! At Christmas and Easter, we often gather stories and Donna prints them in beautiful booklets. Sean often offers stories to the kiddos during Sunday service. When small groups meet, individuals come alive through the sharing of their personal stories.

But today I'm pondering the down side of storytelling, especially in faith communities like First Baptist Church. What stories are we sharing that are less than positive? Here are some I've heard and some I've said.

"This old building is an albatross around our necks."

"Certain volunteers are control freaks."

"When all the old folks die, how will FBC survive?"

"Most of the songs we sing are outdated, patriarchal, and/or boring."

"We get things done by the speed of volunteers. Snail's pace!"

"This building sits empty most of the week. That's not good."

When I hear myself telling a less-than-positive story, I try to ask myself: Is it true? Is it kind? Is it necessary? I confess to the last comment about the building sitting empty most of the week. I know I have uttered this numerous times over the years, especially during our Strategic Planning process. Not long ago I said it at a Board meeting. Erika's response was spot on: "I know people think that, but it's not true!!! This building is buzzing with activities and groups every day and evening of the week." Busted! I realized in that moment that I've been guilty of negative stories about FBC. Perpetuating something that was not true, not kind, nor was it necessary. I apologize!

My wish is for each of us to take the time to engage in stories with those we encounter at FBC. When we catch ourselves being negative, maybe we could kindly and respectfully remind the other (and self) and shift into something more generative than limiting. We are about to enter an exciting window of time by co-creating a five-year plan for FBC. Maybe we should start with what's working rather than what's not working. Bring to the table our highest wishes and visions, and at the same time let go of negativity and blame.

I sense a community-wide ritual sometime soon. May we individually and collectively let go in order to create space for God's vision for FBC.

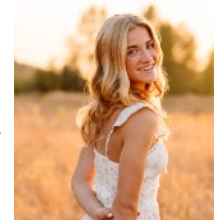

## Re-new. Re-create. Re-imagine.



Participants create quilt squares with words or pictures in response to the prompt: "We all have a right to..." Answers included: "enjoy trees," "dignity and safety," and "belong."

On May 17, friends from around the area gathered in FBC's Fireplace Room for Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon's Interfaith Earth Summit, themed "Re-new. Re-create. Re-imagine." This statewide event invited people to gather at local hubs to learn about climate care efforts around Oregon and to build community by sharing our hopes and reasons for being involved in earth care work.

Using recycled paper, we each created an image for a quilt square. All of the images from around the state will be made into a quilt in the shape of Oregon and shared with the Oregon state legislature to encourage their efforts to protect our environment. EMO is working on other settings for the quilt to be shared as well.

One of our most important learnings from the event: climate resilience experts said when studying places experiencing disaster, they've discovered that what matters--more than all of the preparations made, personnel available, or systems in place--is just this: *How well do people know their neighbors?* It is community, above all else, that helps us survive and thrive in the midst of difficulty or crisis--someone who can say, "I know whose dog that is!" or "We should check on Joe, he might not have heard the sirens!" Knowing one another helps us keep each other safe. Surely there is a role for the church in this neighbor-making work.

### Our Offering to the World

In June, FBC McMinnville highlights One Great Hour of Sharing.

Like the loaves and fishes, a little goes a long way. In 2025, grants supported emergency relief and development and ministry to displaced people, both locally and worldwide.

Examples include solar power for schools, programs for children with learning differences, water projects, food and shelter ministries, refugee and immigration ministry, after-school programs, and disaster relief from hurricanes, earthquakes, measles, floods, wildfires, and aid for undocumented asylum seekers.
