



Creating Some Softness with Safe Families for Children

First Baptist Church is a Safe Families church, and that means we are part of something beautiful: a community of people choosing to come alongside individuals and families when life becomes difficult. Through Safe Families for Children, people from FBC are hosting children, encouraging and supporting parents, and meeting practical needs that can make an overwhelming season a little more manageable. In doing so, you are not only helping people through a difficult moment—you are making a difference in individual lives and helping reshape the future of families.

Recently, a young person who has been hosted in a Safe Families host home reached an exciting milestone: she is launching into college life. There is much excitement in beginning this new chapter, and countless practical things needed to make a dorm room feel like home.

Because of the generosity of people at FBC, she received towels, a dorm refrigerator, extension cords, a mattress topper, and other brand new supplies for her new life at college. These are ordinary things, but they are also a tangible way of saying: *We see you. We believe in you. You don't have to do this alone.* What a beautiful picture of what Safe Families can make possible. A young person who was welcomed into a host home is now heading to college surrounded by people cheering her on, helping her take this next step.

And this is happening in so many different ways through our Safe Families ministry: Next week, a volunteer from FBC will help a mom learn to drive. School supplies are being purchased for a child whose family is on the edge of eviction. Other volunteers are opening their homes and their lives to children and supporting parents who need encouragement. The needs look

An Encompass employee will do laundry and supervise showers at FBC for neighbors who need these services. Details have been worked out so that all parties feel good about the arrangement.

Thoughts:

How have you been lately? For me, sometimes good, sometimes bad. I am sure you can relate.

If you haven't heard, Jim Kilinsky has been admitted into Hospice again. I sure you have heard the story of how he "flunked out of Hospice the first time." It is a great story that demonstrates Jim's willpower. We, his family & friends, don't think he will flunk out this time.

My relationship with Jim has grown. From the time when he joined FBC during COVID, through serving with him on the Climate Action and Social Justice Committees, Chapel Class, and with Choir, my relationship with Jim and his sons has changed from a general "good feeling" to respect to love. When I began to give Jim rides from Dallas to FBC and back, our relationship deepened as we discussed our lives, politics, and books.

I had family dinners with the Kilinsky family, worked the technology booth with Tom, and had many conversations with each of the Kilinsky men. I heard each person's perspective. Here is a short, not exclusive, list of things that Jim cares deeply about: (a) seeing no stranger, (b) reducing plastic, (c) GMO foods, (d) LGBTQ+ people and their rights, (e) I know he cares about family, friends, and me.

My father, also a Jim, died. Jim Kilinsky and I developed a father-daughter style of relationship. He demonstrated some of the qualities that I wish my father had had. I told Jim Kilinsky that he was rehabilitating the name Jim for me.

Is everyone in the Kilinsky family doing the best they can? How about his support network? Yes, I believe we all are doing the best we can.

Here is the kernel of the observation I would like to make: I am in the midst of an incredibly bittersweet experience. I get to see the sweetness of a loving Church Community. You have heard it said, "*We are God's hands on Earth.*" I see us (Jim's church family, neighbors, and friends) demonstrating unconditional love. Jim's impending death is hard for me and for others. And the process of helping the Kilinsky family is sweet for me. I wouldn't see this sweetness without us facing Jim's death. Life is such a learning process and learning to love is not for the faint of heart. Praise be and Namaste.

Geoff's family (minus youngest, Rowan, now in high school but born into this congregation) first showed up on a Sunday in October 2008. Soon after, his health took a nasty turn, and they were wrapped up in the comfort of meals from a dozen different congregants, activities for the kids, and Kent Harrop stopping by to check in. By December son Teddy was a classically-trained Wise Man, bathrobe and all, for the kids' Christmas pageant. He says, "That's how fast this place was family."

Early in the 2010s Geoff served the Board as Vice Moderator with the "gracefully versatile" Bruce Wyatt and the "thoughtful and beloved" Bill Apel, and as Children & Family chair. After the tragic loss of FBC's pianist in 2010, he stepped in as a stopgap — August this year marks 16 years he's been in the role. He had the greatest gift of his working life managing the McMinnville Community Low-Barrier Shelter out of the Social Hall for several years. Now he's back on the Board as chair of the creative and "existentially chill" Worship & Community Engagement Team, seeing it as a chance to give back to the church family that's been an essential, irreplaceable home, a place of love and care, through some of the worst and very best moments of his life. He thinks it's a gift, too, to be part of a communal, democratic congregation that understands itself as a family like the Jesus Movement first intended.

Misquoting Johnny Cash, Geoff says curiosity has led him "everywhere, man..." He's drawn, sometimes driven, to understand other people and this bafflingly cool Creation we're all in. He's lived overseas, been in many different cultures and subcultures, always with the chance to learn more. He didn't know it was making him ready to find a calling in the middle of his life — serving our siblings who empire has impoverished in many different ways, who are some of the most human of us in the hardest and also most miraculous ways — but turns out, it did.

Community-Building and Peacemaking with ABC Global Servant Mylinda Baits

Mylinda Baits, a global servant with whom FBC has a long-standing



relationship, led us at our Worship in the Park gathering in August. When she's not on home assignment visiting churches (or playing with her new grandbabies!), she spends much of her time supporting community workers in Cuba. She is currently co-leading a sixth cohort for the Expressive Arts in Transition program. The cohort consists of twelve facilitators-in-training, each of whom leads an arts-based practice group whose members use imagination and body-based grounding exercises for psychosocial and community support. Some of the practice groups are focused on young adults, some on senior adults, and some on psychology and social work professionals who work in public health and community care. Mylinda and her ministry partner are mentoring six graduates of previous programs, and those graduates have begun to lead much of the training. Current political tensions have kept Mylinda and her partner from traveling to Cuba recently, so they have done some video trainings, joined virtually, and offered guidance as their mentees conduct the on-the-ground work in their communities.

"It's gone really well," Mylinda said. "Each of the small groups becomes a sort of community, in a time when they really need the support. They get electricity maybe two hours a day, and they never know when that will be. So a lot of life has been really unpredictable for them. Many young people have left Cuba looking for more stability, and children and older people are feeling a bit abandoned. We're trying to be supportive to populations that tend to be the most impacted, the least able to find support on their own. It's been sad for me to not be there in person, but our leaders are really stepping up and learning so much."

Mylinda asks for our prayers as she undertakes another project: she will go to Thailand in November to co-facilitate (with local leaders) a workshop with women from northeast India who are peacemakers. She noted that in patriarchal contexts, women are often not included in the peacemaking process, but experience shows that when they are, the work is more effective, as they are often change-makers within their communities. Softness (*continued from page one*) different, but the response is the same: we come alongside.

Today, I stopped at Staples to pick up a backpack and composition books for a boy who starts middle school next week. His family recently received an eviction notice. Because of funding cuts, YCAP cannot help the family until there is a court-ordered eviction. While other kids are shopping for school clothes at the mall, this family is wondering where they will live this fall. In that uncertainty, Safe Families is mobilizing. People are coming together to create a safety net around this family. We may not be able to change every circumstance they are facing, but we can make sure they are not facing it alone.

As I stood looking at binders, I noticed a grandmother helping her granddaughter choose school supplies. It was such an ordinary, tender moment, I found myself thinking about all the people who have come alongside us throughout our lives.

Maybe someone gave you a ride to swimming lessons, helped you when your family was going through a difficult time, babysat while someone was in the hospital, or simply noticed a need and offered what they could. That kind of help can seem ordinary at the time, but looking back, we realize how much it meant. That is what I see happening at FBC. A dorm refrigerator. A set of towels. School supplies. A driving lesson. A meal. A listening ear. A few hours of someone's time. A willingness to open your home. These things may seem small, but they can create some softness in a life that feels very hard.

We don't always know what our neighbors are carrying. We cannot fix every circumstance, but we can make sure people don't have to face them alone. Thank you, FBC, for making a difference in individual lives, for strengthening families, and for helping create new possibilities for folks standing at a difficult crossroads. 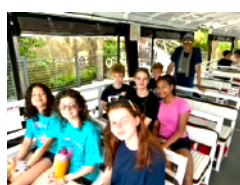
